THURS. IN GLADES

Some gardeners don't like using corrosive sublimate (mercury) bi-iodide for controlling thrips in gladioli because of the extremely poisonous nature of this chemical.

For those who do not want corrosive sublimate around the place, Lysol may be used instead. It is used at the rate of four teaspoonsful to one gallon of water. A six hour soaking of the combs, either peeled or unpeeled, is necessary with Lysol.

The Department reserves the right to demand from any successful tenderer, before awarding the order, a security deposit in the form of a certified cheque on a chartered bank in Canada, made payable to the order of the Honourable the Minister of Public Works, equal to 10 per cent of the amount of the tender, or bearer bonds of the Dominion of Canada or of the Canadian National Railway Co. and its constituent companies unconditionally guaranteed as to principal and interest by the Dominion of Canada, or the aforementioned bank, and a certified cheque, if required to make up an odd amount.

Such security will serve as a guarantee for the proper fulfillment of the contract.
