CCF ENTERPRISES IN SASKATCHEWAN

From official figures we learn that the CCF government in Saskatchewan failed in Canada last year. This will be news to most people as nothing was made of the matter in the public press. No conclusions were drawn from the figures to prove that private or "free" enterprise was a failure. It is a normal occurrence and so called for no comment. However, in Saskatchewan where the CCF government has been showing "initiative", a question that we are told, would arise under a socialist government. It had, in order to diversify the province's economy, so as not to have it so dependent on the single industry of wheat farming, and also to provide a service to the people, started up about a dozen small businesses known as crown corporations. Three of these have so far not shown a profit.

This fact has proven a god-send, however, to opponents of public ownership and democratic socialism. These three small concerns—a shoe factory and tannery, a wool-mill and a fish-bone processing plant—a total of about 200 people—were largely experimental not designed primarily to make a profit but to provide a service to the people of Saskatchewan. Together they represent only 5 per cent of the government investment in crown corporations. There are 17 of these, a few of which were in existence previous to the CCF taking over in 1944.

During 1948 the crown corporations taken together enjoyed net earnings of \$3,540,000. That is the people of Saskatchewan got a return of 89 per cent on their investment. This figure was arrived at after full allowance had been made for depreciation and interest. It includes the relatively minor enterprises we have mentioned which showed a loss during the year but it is emphasized that this is not the objective of these enterprises.

In short, the crown corporations of Saskatchewan are proving to be sound investments for the people of the province even when taken from a strictly financial point of view. This, however, is not the end of the story. The benefits the people receive such as from an efficient provincially owned bus service, from an expanding electric power system with four reductions in rates from their own corporations, marketing fur and timber in the interests of the public and the small producer can never be shown adequately.

If Saskatchewan's crown corporations had been initiated by private interest, such a record would be regarded as remarkably good. Even so, observers who have no axe to grind would consider this report as being on the side of under-achievement. No claims of excess are set being made by the recently inaugurated but promising bus company, airways corporation, a sodium sulphate plant and others. Most people in Saskatchewan consider that these enterprises are making an important contribution to the life of the province.

The enterprises which are unquestionably successful are the fur marketing service, the timber mill, the reconstruction corporation, the insurance office, the printing plant, the telephone corporation and the power corporation. All of these companies are turning in good profits, but more important they are providing valuable services to the people at a reasonable cost. In all its activities the CCF government in Saskatchewan has shown itself ready to undertake bold experiments to promote the welfare of the people. This has been the case in regard to crown corporations no less than in the other fields. One or two mistakes have been made which the government has admitted. And what government has not made mistakes? What would an opposition have to go on if they exist? But the Saskatchewan CCF government has pioneered in several new fields, fields that have been regarded as the special preserves of private profit making.

The CCF government is a truly people's government and the CCF is a truly people's party. Financially and fully controlled as to policies and program by the common people and not by the big financial interests. There you have the real reasons for the campaign of lies and misrepresentation. The great social objectives of the CCF government are almost completely ignored. Success in this mercenary profit-fiddling world is measured principally by financial dividends and not by socially beneficial achievements.

But the people of Saskatchewan, who are in the best position to judge, gave the CCF 2,000 more votes in the last election in spite of the most costly, most vicious election campaign ever waged by the Liberal and Tory opposition and in spite of the fact that the province's two big daily papers are strongly anti-CCF. The facts were quite obviously too strong to be overcome.
