

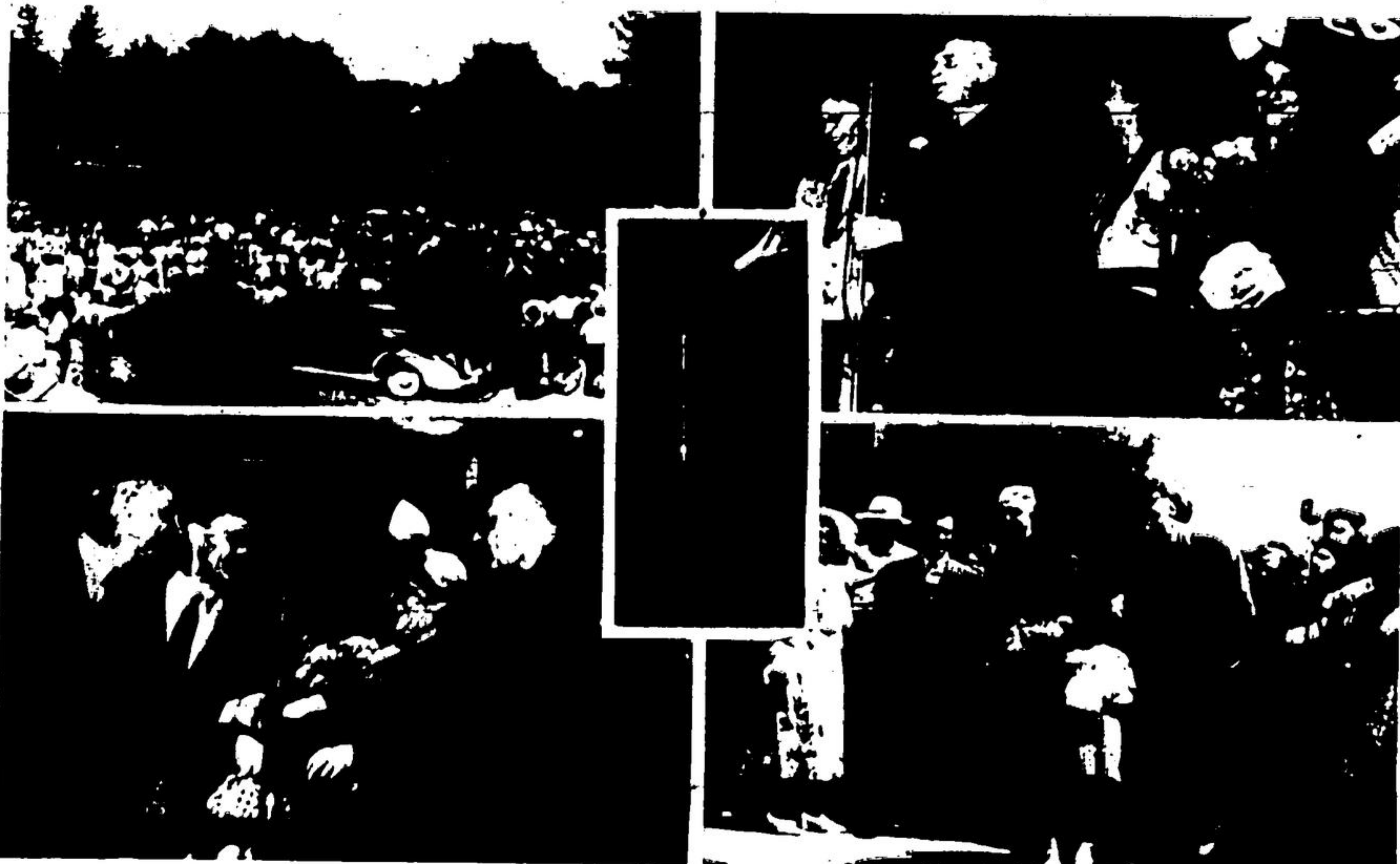

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CANADA'S PRIME MINISTER VISITS ACTON AND WELCOMED BY THROG



Tuesday morning's memorable event in Acton is shown in the above Free Press pictures. For the first time in the history of this community a Canadian Prime Minister paid a visit and spoke to the citizens in their own community. Mr. Hughes Cleaver, Halton's aggressive member arranged the visit hurriedly on Monday and had Mr. St. Laurent speak at Acton and Georgetown in his constituency before returning to Toronto to the big rally in that city.

St. Laurent and his granddaughter, the charming Miss Louise Samson and the hearty chuckle of Hughes Cleaver like camera caught one of the moments when Mr. St. Laurent's witiness had brought smiles to all faces. In the lower left picture the editor of the Free Press G. A. Dilla was among those citizens who had the honor of meeting Hon. and Mrs. St. Laurent on this visit to Acton. Prime Minister Made Brief Visit and Address in Acton Tuesday

Big Enthusiastic Gathering Augmented by School Children and Acton Boys' and Girls' Band Gave Sincere Reception to the St. Laurents—Greeted by Reeve and Mrs. Jones and Halton's Member, Hughes Cleaver—Spoke to Audience Which Jammed the Station Platform and All Points of Vantage

One of the biggest gatherings ever to accord a welcome to any visiting dignitary at Acton station greeted Prime Minister Hon. Louis St. Laurent and Mrs. St. Laurent and their daughter and granddaughter when their train made a brief stop at Acton on Tuesday morning. Citizens and school children, the aged and the babies stood in the brooding sun for over an hour until the train arrived from the west and greeted the Prime Minister with an ovation that was as sincere as the greeting Mr. St. Laurent gave to one and all on his brief visit.

The Public School children were given a holiday and marched to the station and the Boys' and Girls' Band was on parade and at the station to make the reception complete. The train was delayed over half an hour owing to the station reception which greeted the Prime Minister at Guelph.

On arrival in Acton little Margaret Wilson presented a beautiful bouquet of flowers and the Prime Minister thrilled the little lass when he told her that Mrs. St. Laurent always received the flowers, but he always received the kiss.

Mr. Hughes Cleaver, member for Halton, introduced to Mr. and Mrs. St. Laurent, Reeve and Mrs. Theron Jones, chairman of the Acton School Board, Mr. Thomas Jones, Mr. Norman McEachern and Editor G. A. Dilla. But the faces of the visitors were wreathed in special smiles when they met Mr. W. J. O. Oakes who spent his early days in Compton County, the home of the St. Laurents. There's nothing quite equal to meeting friends from one's home community. Mr. Oakes has kindly loaned us a picture post card showing the Main Street of Compton Quebec as it appeared thirty-five years ago when they both knew it. Along the street can be seen the Village store operated by the Prime Minister's father in this little community of 500 or 600. Perhaps it is the memory of these boyhood days that has made Canada's Prime Minister so anxious in his tour to meet the people from so many of the small towns of this great Dominion.

Mr. St. Laurent said he believed in the majority rule and he felt that if the majority of children present signified they wanted a holiday for the rest of the day, the Board Chairman and members would be obliged to take recognition of that majority vote and grant a holiday. The ovation which this received left no doubt of the majority in the matter and the Prime Minister said he was pleased to note that in this vote at least there was no disgruntled minority.

As the train pulled away the Band played "O Canada" and the St. Laurents and Mr. Cleaver waved greetings from the platform. The whole event was hurriedly arranged so successfully in such a short time. The party was also scheduled to stop in Georgetown in the Halton riding and that evening the big Toronto meeting was booked for the Maple Leaf Gardens.

North Halton to Meet on School District Plans

The proposal of re-decorating at Acton School was approved in general and tenders were to be called for painting the corridors and two rooms, and the chicken house and tool shed at Milton School, when the North Halton High School Board met at Milton on Monday night.

Mr. Leithbridge was re-elected as teacher of music at Milton School and was appointed as representative of the Board to the Music Festival Association.

G. A. Dilla, a member of the delegation which interviewed the representatives of the Department of Education in Toronto, recently made a trip to the Board. He stated that the Department would give no approval to the erection of a new school at Acton. The central school for the district was still in approval with the department and could be erected at a cost of from \$1000 to \$1200 per pupil of enrollment. It might be that school's taking pupils up to Grade 10 would be maintained in the three towns but for the grades above that, one central school was the answer to the problem. Arrangements had been made for department officials to attend a meeting to be held in Stewarttown on July 7th, when Stewarttown would be represented and the whole plan discussed.

The tender of Mr. A. H. Tufford for building cupboards at Milton School was approved at a cost of \$250.

Accounts amounting to \$7,699.19 were approved for payment.

Acton Council in a regular session convened at the Park on Tuesday. The Volunteer Fire Brigade demonstrated the action of the proposed pumper for the benefit of Council. Pumping water from Fairy Lake the firemen were able to keep four fog nozzles supplied with a heavy stream of water. Applying two high nozzle streams of water was found forty to fifty feet in the air. The imitation exercises of this organization were also played.

Meeting in the park with the Swimming Pool Committee also the Council discussed the possibility of the various sites. The Committee is to submit a draft plan to the Council before a final decision is made.

Ray Goodwin requested special parking privileges on the Main Street adjacent to or within reasonable distance of his office. He presented approval granted by those affected in the matter. Council left the matter in the hands of the Board of Councillors.
