

NEW MARKETS PAY OFF

Perhaps the most striking single fact that comes from an analysis of trading this year to date is that new markets and new export lines are paying off handsomely as Canada seeks to maintain her foreign trade in face of tightening world restrictions and controls reports The Financial Post.

For example our trade with sterling countries other than U.K. and B.W.L is higher to date by 55 per cent than a year ago. That's solely because India jumped her purchases from \$6 millions to \$33 millions. Pakistan from \$100,000 to \$44 millions in the first four months of this year.





