DISPOSING of Oakville's highly touted juveniles is never regarded lightly by opposing clubs in the H.C. Juvenile bracket. Nevertheless, Acton Juniors had little trouble breezing through to a 9-4 victory on Saturday to keep their victory skem intact and remain at the head of the class in the junior loop. With a bright display of bang up ball, they served notice of shaping into one of the best minor clubs to hail from Acton in some years and promise to make customers forget inferior goods of less provident seasons. The club is equally strong in all departments with an ample stock of top reserves. In fact it is the belief of mentor Bill Holloway that he can substitute at will in infield and outfield and still retain starting strength. On Saturday he benched older, more experienced players in favour of the younger element. It gives all the kids a chance to play and in addition there was no indication of excessive weakness at any position. Harry Lawson obligingly dished up a free hit performance, manning Oaks to only one extra base hit. Townsley, back stopping for Lawson, is probably the most improved player on the team. Besides smashing a triple and a double he kept the visitors on the bags with an accurate throwing arm. With addition of one more pitcher the club should remain as the top-flight team in the league. Incidentally, it might be of interest to fans to know that Lawson hasn't had an earned run scored against him in both league starts out of six possibilities.

IF A DEAL IS CLOSED between a pair of interested Guelph hurlers and the Acton Int. Club, the locals will terminate H.C. 1, proceedings. On Tuesday night Jack Hough and Lou Bagnato, two Guelph hurlers were recruited to a trial. To say the least, they impressed onlookers. With an allowance of four imports, the management are determined to bring back a winning team to Acton even if they are required to advance into Intermediate A. It was the conviction of officials that all the present team lacked was pitchers. They realized that Sam Snyder could not carry the team alone. So they commenced a search for available moundsmen. Hearing of Lou Bagnato, they approached the stocks right-handed to see if he would be interested in a season with Acton. It was. 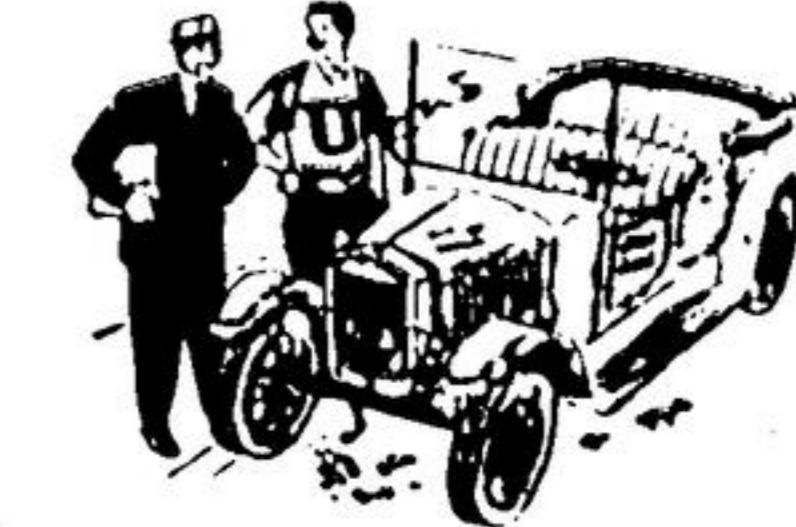
