SINGLE HEDGES BEST

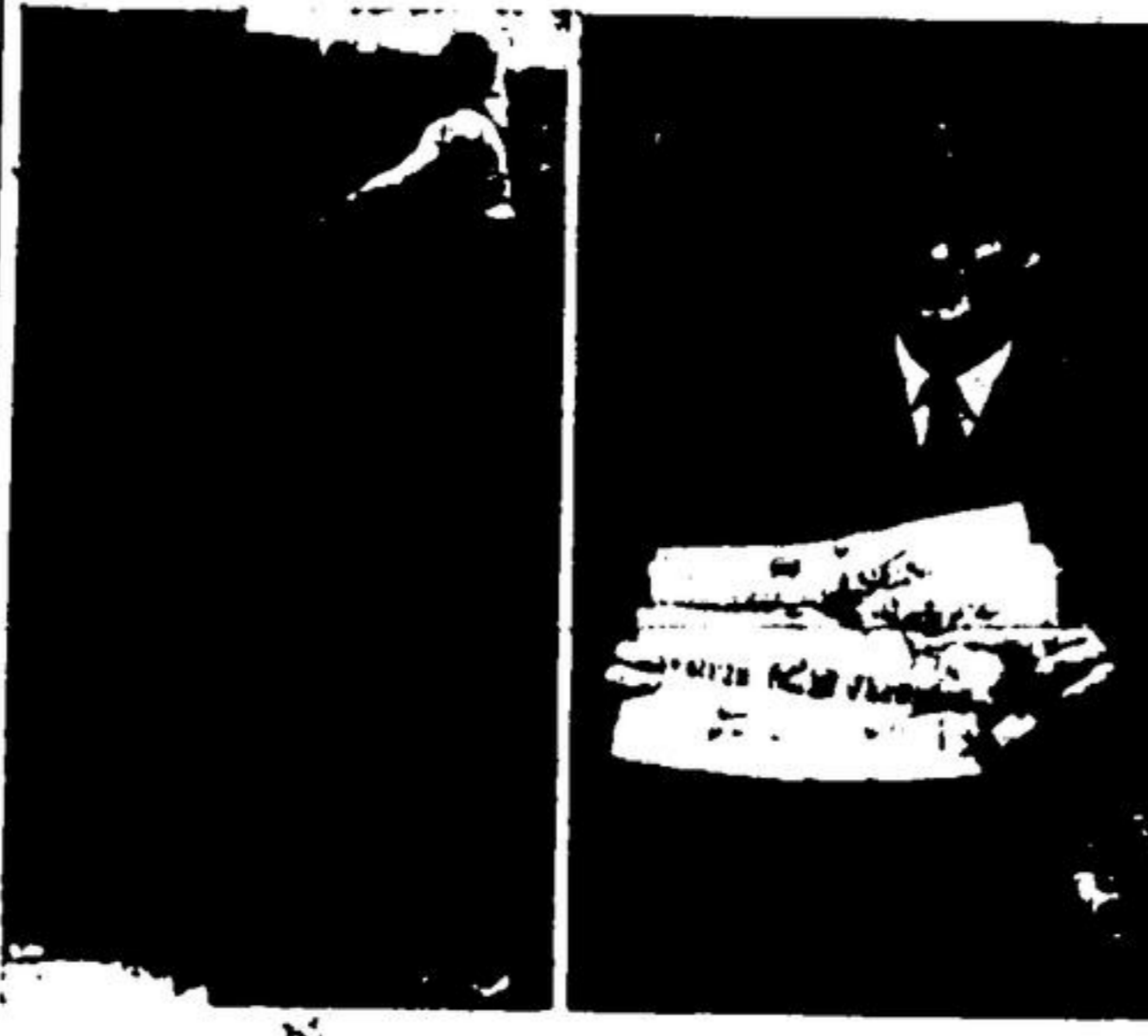
The question is sometimes raised as to whether hedge plants should be set out in a single row, or in a double one with the plants staggered.

This latter method uses more plants and more space is harder to trim into good shape and leaves a poor end at a gate or path where an unevenness is noticed. Under normal conditions, horticultural officials of the Dominion Department of Agriculture say that single plantings of hedges are advisable.

STUDY REFRIGERATION

A model refrigerator car has been designed in the refrigeration and food engineering section of the Division of Applied Biology, National Research Council. The purpose of this experiment is to find a method for more even temperature distribution and also to provide for lower temperatures in refrigerator cars by means of increased air circulation within the cars, increase of cooling surfaces and possibly the use of additional insulation.

Old Newspapers Reveal History



Three newspapers were discovered in good state of repair while workmen were demolishing the high board fence surrounding the yard last week. Finding of the papers established the fact that the fence was built 64 years ago while William Van Allen was Guelph.
