Crop Situation Critical in Halton Crop prospects in Halton on May 1st never looked better However, since April 1st in the Hornby-Milton area there has been a total of 157 mehes of rainfall up to June 25 During that same period in 1948 there was approximately 74 inches The remarkable thing is that the grain crops despite the lack of moisture continued to hold healthy edlouring. That can only be attributed to the fact that the soil never worked better than last spring and the mulch on top has helped to conserve what little moisture was available. On Tuesday last the area along the front of the County from Mt Nemo in a line to Palermo and Oakville received a three hour rain which materially helped that section. Nearly all farmers are short of hay. Haying operations are well advanced and it is questionable if over 30 per cent -of normal crop of hay will be taken off 1948 seedings for the most part have hardly been worth cutting. The old standby, Alfalfa, plus Orchard Grass, Brome and Reed Canary Grass have been the life savers. Pasture is just about non existant on many farms and in some cases the odd oat field is being sacrificed as pasture. One could go on and on but what is the use of writing something which isn't new to our readers. We might just as well-comfort ourselves by remembering that seldom if ever do things turn out as badly as we are inclined
