service went to the Sick Children's Hospital in Toronto.

Two minutes silence was observed at the opening of the church service in honor of those who paid the supreme sacrifice in two World Wars.

Capt. the Rev. D. C. Smith, M.C., the guest speaker, said the results of this day's resolutions would be visible at the next centennial. He thought the audience should resolve to remember the history of the Township especially of the pioneers and the contribution of those in two world wars.

The second resolution should be to remember our homes and third all should resolve to remember our God. On these three resolutions and their ramifications would depend the future of the township.

Township History

A centre of interest and sometimes controversy was the booth at the gate entrance where sale of the "Nasagaweya Centennial—1850-1950" was conducted under the chairmanship of Mr. M. J. Carton. The history, a red cloth-bound volume of a hundred pages traced the townships for the 100 years. It found ready acceptance and most of the 500 volumes in the issue were sold during the three days and to fill orders from those unable to attend it's a volume that will be printed now and later and includes the fine history compiled by Joshua Norrish in 1888.

Not An Accident

To Corp. Ray Mason and the Provincial and local police and committee who handled the traffic for the three days and the public who cooperated to make it an accident free event certainly should go on record. It was a big task, well handled.

Nasagaweya has had its Centennial. It was without a doubt the biggest event in the history of the Township and whether you spell it Nasagaweya or Nasagaweya it was put on the map and Brookville now has improved roads and hall entrance, some fine permanent lighting and memories of reunion that will live for years.

Every winter the seal herds from the Bering Sea desert the icy blasts and head south to California. After lazing around in the sunny southern waters for three or four months, they swim north to the barren Pribilof Islands to spend the summer.
