**The Sunday School Lesson**  
 SUNDAY, AUGUST 14th, 1948  
**FESTIVAL SONGS**  
 Golden Text—  
 O give thanks unto the Lord, call upon his name;  
 Make known among the peoples his doings: Ps. 105: 1.  
 Lesson Text—Ps. 105: 1-6; 117: 118: 19-24.  
 Exposition—II. Seek the Lord, Ps. 105: 1-6.  
 There will be no true thanksgiving until people seek the Lord. It is those who know the Lord in the manner that He affects their lives who offer Him true praise (Isa. 12). When men can see God's providence in their prosperity, they will seek to glorify Him in their stewardship (1 Chron. 16: 28; 29; Prov. 3: 9; 1 Cor. 4: 2). When they see, in adversity, God's discipline, they will glorify Him in their patience and hope (Rom. 5: 3, 5; 1 Sam. 4: 9; Prov. 24: 10; Heb. 13: 3). When they seek moral and spiritual victory over sin because God in His grace has suffered their judgment in Christ on Calvary, they will be filled with the joy of the Lord (Neh. 8: 10; Job. 15: 11; Ac. 7: 28; 13: 52; 20: 24; Gal. 5: 22; Heb. 12: 1, 2). It

takes men and women who know the Lord to render Him proper adoration and praise for this worship is the response of awakened and Spirit-filled souls (Jno. 4: 23, 24; Ps. 90: 17; Isa. 61: 3; Heb. 12: 14).  
 To arrive at this high and blessed estate, we are to "seek the Lord" (v. 4). The repeated emphasis is necessary. Natural men have not the disposition to seek the Lord unless they are impressed with the importance to do so. God commands us to seek His face (Ps. 27: 8). It is this turning to God which is the first step in salvation. The Prodigal Son (Luke 15: 11-24) was not within the scope of redemption until he started home. Sinners, likewise, are not drawing near to being saved until they begin to think of God and start drawing nigh to Him. That is why, in evangelistic meetings and in soul winning it is so necessary to get the sinner on his knees seeking after God. When sincerely done, he is certain to find Him and, in finding Him, also come within the orbit of that gracious redemption which He is offering to sinners (Jer. 29: 13; Isa. 55: 6, 7; Jno. 17: 3). This is the beginning. As we go on looking to Jesus (Heb. 12: 1, 2), we increase in capacity to praise. The bounty of God's grace is like an ever-flowing river, bringing on its waters the blessings of heaven, to make glad the heart and to create a radiant life filled with the Redeemer's praise (Eph. 10: 21).  
 If A World Filled with Praise (Ps. 117).  
 It is provisioned in this psalm. It shows how universal is that worship which the Bible exhorts. It takes in all nations. The vision of the oracles of God is a world filled with the praises of the Lord (Rom. 15: 4-13; 1 Chron. 16: 34-36). The ground for this universal praise is twofold: (1) "For his merciful kindness is great toward us." Here again it is retrospective. We are looking back to the grace and providence of God in past favors which have brought about a peaceful and happy present (Ps. 103: 8-12). God always plans the best welfare of those who commit their lives and affairs into His hands. It is true of individuals but it is also true of the whole world. When sin and its consequent anguish are no more, after this world has been judged and purged (Heb. 12: 25-29), the new heaven and the new earth will be filled with holiness and glory (Rev. 21: 7, 8). (2) "The truth of the Lord endureth for ever." Truth in this sense means that eternal and holy wisdom, knowledge and understanding which is eternal. Shams, frauds, pretensions, inventions of vain and ignorant men, wicked imaginations of limited and unregenerate beings, the schemes of deliberately sinful creatures—all these belong to that estate which is to pass away and be no more. Certainly, we ought to love our souls enough to forsake all such and follow Jesus Who is "the way, the truth and the life" without reservations.  
 Many complain that God has dealt unjustly with them, that He has made them suffer more than they deserve. If they were not blind they would see that no man has suffered as much as he deserves. When our transgressions are forgiven we and our transgressions will never meet again. God's feeling toward them that fear Him is the feeling of a father toward his children in their sufferings. If any father will stop and think how he felt when he saw his child in awful suffering, or as the child was passing out of this world, he will have some faint conception of how God feels toward us in our wanderings and sins, as well as in our sorrows. He knows just what sort of stuff we are made of and does not expect the impossible of us (v. 14; of Ps. 78: 28, 29; 80: 46, 47) nor suffer us to be tempted above that which we are able to bear (1 Cor. 10: 13). Jehovah has a throne; that throne is "in the heavens."  
 III. The Duty of Man, Ps. 118: 19-24.  
 These psalms are selections from what the Hebrews called "The Hallel," a collection of different sorts between Psalms 111 and 118. The 118th is therefore, the climax. These verses selected are twofold in significance: (1) Being the description of a redeemed and righteous soul entering into the presence of the Lord with victorious song in the heart and on the lips. (2) Second, being a reference to the victory of our Lord Jesus over sin, over His enemies (vs. 22, 23) and, setting up the Day of the Lord. It is a glorious vision of God's triumph and of the believers' part in it. Notice how praise and righteousness go together. God's Kingdom is holy and were it not for sin, the world would be filled with righteousness and praise. Redemption means that God, in Christ, is winning back this lost world. He sent Jesus to make redemption possible through the cross. Those who accept the blood atonement of the Cross enter God's Kingdom and seek His righteousness (Mat. 6: 33).
