



Morley Sherwood Has Top Yield in Halton 50 Bushel Winter Wheat Club

Yield figures in connection with the Halton 50 Bushel Winter Wheat Club have just been released by the Ontario Agricultural College. The respective yields are based on small plots cut in each of the competitors' fields. Tests were completed yesterday prior to actual construction operations at the Maple Avenue site which proved the new deep well source to be capable of yielding 715 gallons a minute.

Present prospects point to the sowing of a large acreage of fall wheat in Halton during the next two or three weeks. Some planting has already been done. Cornell 505 would appear to be the popular variety being sown. This variety is stated by both Ottawa and Guelph Experimental Stations to exceed the old reliable, Dawson's Golden Chaff by two or three bushels per acre. However, the main superiority of Cornell over Dawson's lies in its resistance to loose smut. This should not be interpreted to mean that it is not necessary to treat both varieties for control of the stinking smut or bunt. One of the chief reasons such as cereal will control the latter type of smut but unfortunately there is no practical treatment against the loose smut to which Dawson's Golden Chaff is quite subject.

Recently another variety of wheat has been released through the mail by the Egyptian Amber Wheat Association of Markham. This so-called "Wonder" Wheat according to W. H. Waddell Wheat Specialist at the Ontario Agricultural College is incorrectly named and further more in our experience is far from immune to smut and is a mixture of varieties. It would appear that the Egyptian Amber Wheat Association at Markham is now looking for buyers further afield but it is to be hoped no one in Halton will be gullible enough to fall for the unadulterated mass of misrepresentation contained in the circular in question.

The Sunday School Lesson
SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 11th

JESUS AND THE PSALMS
Golden Text
The stone which the builders rejected is become the head of the corner.

Lesson Text Ps 118: 22-23, Matt 21: 33-44, Luke 11: 20, Heb 1: 13, 10: 12, 13, Heb 5: 6, 6: 13, 20: 7, 1: 3, 280: V 1. Attests the Dicty of our Lord "God addresses His Son. As the manifest God, Jesus is yet to see all things put under His feet (Heb 2: 5, 9, Rev 19: 11-21, 21: 1-4).

The argument concerning the manifestation of the Second Person of the Trinity is a constant one. It tests whether Christ have or have not faith in God and His revelation in His Word. In Matt 22: 41-45 our Lord is testing His hearers. The Old Testament as well as the New Testament teaches the Dicty of the Christ (Ps 45: 1-6). Jesus' quotation was from Ps 110. He pronounces this Psalm to be of Davidic authority and Messianic in its application. Many of the Higher Critics deny this. If these critics are right then Jesus built an argument for His Dicty either on a mistake or a deliberate fraud. Any man who deserves the name of Christian can easily decide between the Higher Critics and Christ. This same Psalm is applied to Christ or ascribed to David in many other places in the New Testament (Ac 2: 34, 35, 1 Cor 15: 25, Heb 1: 3, 13, 10: 12, 13, 12: 2). David spoke these words "In the Spirit" (R. V.). They are really the Spirit's words not David's. David called Christ "Lord" (John 20: 28, Phil 2: 6, Ac 10: 36, 1 Cor 2: 16, Phil 2: 11). He is in the place of power at God's right hand (Heb 8: 1, 10: 12, 1: 3). The time is coming when all His enemies shall be put underneath His feet. Jesus' third question was indeed a puzzle for the Pharisees, "If David call Him Lord, how is He His Son?" For us this answer is easy. Jesus is the Son of David and Son of God. This the Pharisees were unwilling to admit, so they said nothing.

III. Prophecy of Jesus' Humiliation and Triumph, Ps 118: 22, 32, Matt 21: 40, 42, Luke 24: 44. Christ as the "stone" rejected (John 8: 19) suffers for the redemption of sinners. But He who was despised and rejected, became the corner stone of God's glorious temple (Eph 2: 20). The rejected One became the ruler. The Christ men ignore and despise and claim as their Judge (John 5: 22, 23). Their Almighty God before Whom we must stand to give account (John 14: 11, 12). But they who share His humiliation will yet reign with Him (Rev 11: 15, 20: 6).

TAX-FREE APPAREL SCHEME FOR CANADIAN AND U.S. VISITORS

Up to now visitors to Britain have had to pay purchase tax on articles of apparel bought for use there. Canadian and U.S. citizens on a temporary visit to the United Kingdom may obtain relief from purchase tax on clothing, hats, shoes and gloves (and certain other articles of apparel) not made of fur through a new scheme which is to operate from August 22, 1949. Visitors, on exchanging dollars (or drawing sterling from an American or Canadian account) at a bank, will on request be given a free of charge five purchase tax coupons for every complete \$24 (\$30) so exchanged up to a maximum of 100 coupons a person in any period of 12 months. Each coupon will enable a visitor to buy tax-free, up to £1 (\$4) worth of apparel of the kinds mentioned.
