\$25,945.25 Spent on Township Road in Erin last year

Erin Fire Brigade Paid For Services of Grass Fire On Farm

Erin Township Council met on Saturday, September 3rd, with all the members present and Reeve Goldwin Burt presiding.
Resolutions were passed as follows:
That application be made to the Dept. of Highways for subsidy on \$25,945.25 being expenditure on the Township roads from January 1st, 1949 to August 31st, 1949.

That the treasurer be authorized to draw from the Township account the sum of \$90.10 owing the County Treasurer re taxes for the years, 1945, 1946 and 1947 on the east half of Lot 1, Con. 1, Twp. of Erin.

That the Reeve be instructed to attend the Tax Arrears sale to be held at the Court House, Guelph, on September 21st, 1949, in the interests of the Township.

That Erin Fire Brigade be paid \$25.00 for services rendered at a grass fire on Gordon Jackson's farm.

Accounts passed and ordered paid were as follows: General, \$26.61; Sheep \$80.00; Relief, \$185.34; Road, \$302.21.

Council adjourned to meet again at Hillsburg on Monday, October 3rd at 1:00 o'clock or at the call of the Reeve.

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assured members there would be little difficulty of both counties coming to a satisfactory agreement regarding the separation of Halton's interest in the present Home.

Mrs. Pettit praised the co-operation between the two counties during the best of relationship had always existed. "However, it is most important that we get started on this program at once," she added.

Reeve Armstrong said May, 1950, would likely be the earliest time before plans could be prepared by the architects, and it would be two years before it would be ready to use.

On motion of Wickson and Van Sickle, council approved that the Rounthwaite and Fairchild architects be engaged to prepare plans for the proposed Home for the Aged. Reeve P. W. Chambers, of Oakville, was appointed to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Reeve J. W. Higgins, on the negotiating committee, which will meet next Council later.

Reeve Armstrong was delegated to represent Halton at the Community Welfare Convention being held September 22nd to 24th.

Following notice that the Board of Transport Commissioners would be sitting in Toronto to consider representations regarding the 8th Line crossing in Trafalgar, Reeve W. H. Biggar, chairman of the Road Committee and County Engineer Roy Smith were selected to represent Halton at this meeting.

Following the reading of a communication received from the Rotary Club of Milton, who are seeking permission to erect a wading pool in Victoria Park, members felt the matter should be left in the hands of the building committee for further investigation and consideration.

Council demurred on a request from Magistrate K. M. Langdon who was seeking council's assistance toward the purchase of a new adding machine. The magistrate suggested if Council would approve of paying half the cost, the balance may be born by the magistrate's expense account. It was pointed out council had purchased a used machine some time ago, and it was now in need of repairs. Members felt that if the County was obligated to supply such equipment, a new one should be purchased. Reeve Chambers thought that when the magistrates held court in other counties they should also bear their share of the cost. However, council left the matter in the hands of the Finance Committee for further investigation.

T. A. Patterson, Lincolnton, was appointed Wood Inspector to fill the unexpired term of Alex. Near whose resignation was accepted by council.

The Stewart Contracting company was awarded the contract of re-roofing the county buildings at a cost of \$738. The chairman of the building committee reported only two contracts had been received, and the one accepted was the lowest tender.

Deputy Reeve J. Goodlet reported excellent progress had been made by the Assessment department and that most work has been completed to date. He said only 90 cards remained to be checked and these would be completed by the end of the month. He urged members of council to remind their assessors to forward cards to the county office.

Reeve Biggar reported the county was in receipt of petition from the residents of the Milton Heights area as well as letters from Reeve Van Sickle, Nassagaweya, and Currie, of Esquimaux regarding the given road leading to that community.

Speaking on behalf of the residents and his employer, Interprovincial Brick Co., H. D. Thompson asked council to improve the road. He stated he desired traveling this road during the winter time. The petition stated about 100 yards of this road would be under two feet of water at different times during the year.

Roy Smith told council negotiations had been started two years ago between the Milton Brick Co. and both townships regarding the building of a new roadway in the district. These negotiations had been left in the hands of a solicitor, but had not been completed.

Reeve Currie charged that Milton Brick Co. had closed off the Town Line to make room for their quarry and had built a detour in an adjoining field. Council approved the Warden's suggestion that the matter be left in the hands of the Road Committee for their consideration, and report back to council at the next meeting.

Emphasizing the need for conservation, Reeve George Currie gave a comprehensive report of his attendance at conservation conferences. He stated that 70 per cent of conservation must start on the farm. He said others praised the work and program begun by Halton in connection with reforestation and conservation programs. "Many counties are looking up to Halton who have taken leadership of this program," he declared.

These conferences should be taken and provided to the local press in order that the information might be passed on to those vitally interested.

Praising the committee selected by the government in this matter, Mr. Van Sickle said efforts by each of the three parties were co-operating for one purpose of conservation, especially the conservation of water. Emphasizing the need for water conservation he said Milton had always boasted of adequate water supply from springs and reservoir. He thought this municipality would soon be calling for water just as others have been doing the past year.

Other members felt a strong need for an educational program, in connection with conservation. Deputy Reeve Allen, Burlington, offered the services of his company's projector to show films pertaining to conservation.

Sheriff W. J. Robertson was present to thank council for the attractive manner in which his office had been decorated.

Accounts approved to be paid included: County Buildings, \$2,610.50; Hospitals, \$3,077.40; Agriculture and Reforestation, \$552.01; Finance, \$4,235.40; County Roads, \$30,000.53; Assessment, \$52.30; Printing \$79.97.

NO NEW CASES OF POLIO REPORTED IN HALTON THIS WEEK

No new cases of poliomyelitis have been reported to the Halton County Health Unit since September 4th, 1949. The total for the year is 17 cases with 2 deaths.

The distribution of cases is as follows: Burlington, 2; Nelson, Township, 1; Oakville, 5; Trafalgar, Township, 2; Esquimaux, Township, 2; Georgetown, 1; Acton, 1; Nassagaweya, Township, 3.

The two deaths were a 31 year old man in Esquimaux Township, and a 15 year old girl in Trafalgar Township.

The number of cases of this disease reported throughout the province is becoming less, and it is hoped that the peak of the epidemic has passed.
