The Clerk was authorized to purchase a cap size filing cabinet at a cost of \$57.00.

A letter was read from the Department of Municipal Affairs regarding the proposed legislation for financing the sewer installation. When the procedure for securing assistance has been set down the Department agreed to advise the Municipality.

A letter from the Fire Marshall's Department enclosed a letter sent to the Fire Chief. The department had arranged to have an instructor visit Acton to carry out a training program with the Brigade on Monday, October 3rd.

The Clerk was instructed to write the Bus Company asking if 50 feet was sufficient for parking as Council was prepared to provide space and enforce parking regulations and stop the present congestion on Mill Street.

The Clerk was to notify J. McMullen to have the dirt removed from the sidewalk on Knox Ave. within a week so that broken sidewalk could be repaired before the Fair.

Council adjourned at 12:15 and went to a local restaurant to get a cup of coffee only to find that the proprietor who had urged changing of the by-law so that he could keep open after midnight had closed his establishment, locked the door and refused to give service to half a dozen of the public trade which two weeks previous had been of such great importance. No wonder men get tired of serving on public boards at putting in long hours of municipal duties.

Halton Health Unit Has New Dental Trailer

ized in Ontario, one at St. Catharines-Lincoln Health Unit and the second Halton Health Unit.

The Federal government has made funds available to these areas so that an intensive study can be made into the problem of dental ill health. All costs for this study are to be borne by the Federal Government and all equipment and personnel are provided without cost to the local resident.

In Halton County this study will be headed by Dr. Brian J. O'Meara, Dr. O'Meara is a graduate of the Universities of Birmingham, U.S.A. and Toronto in dentistry and of the School of Hygiene, University of Toronto, in Public Health. He served with the Royal Navy during the war, spent a year in China with the U.N.R.R.A.; and was associated with the Red Cross Society in Northern Ontario. He will be assisted by a dental nurse.

Dr. O'Meara will use a trailer completely equipped for dental examination. He plans to go to each school in the county and a complete dental examination will be offered for each school child. Through the Child Health Centres in various towns an examination of older pre-school children will be done. Each parent will receive a report of the dental condition of the child.

This is not a treatment service, but one of entirely preventative in nature. By routine examination and by education it is hoped that dental conditions will be noted at an age when they can still be controlled.

Halton County is unique in that nearly all the rural schools, free dental treatment through the family dentist is provided by the school boards. This is not the case in towns. Thus, there will be a comparison of results. This project has the endorsement of organized dentistry at county, provincial and Dominion levels.

"It is anticipated that these studies will be carried on for a period of years. From these and similar studies may come information which may help us to solve the problem of dental ill health," Dr. Mather concluded.

AT 2 A.M.

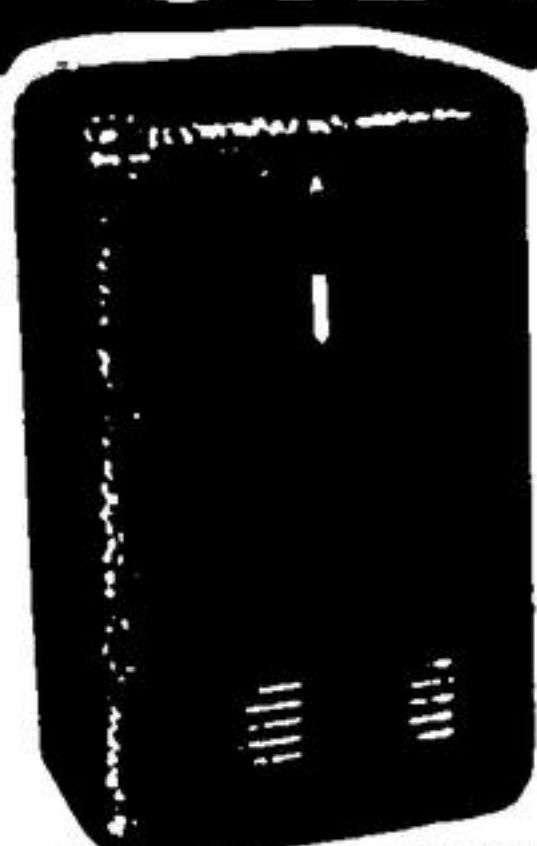
The change is made in accord with neighbouring municipalities and Citizens are requested to observe the terms of the By-Law and thereby avoid confusion.
