There was no scoring until the third inning by either team and it was Leader who started off the circuit collection when his grounder to left field went for a base. Masters' hit was muffed by Winger at short and Leader went to third and Masters to second on the Ridgeway fumble. It was Bob Footitt's clean hit between first and second that sent both sack holders home and Hob stole third. Footitt scored on Runstatter's sacrifice to second and the Acton shortstop was out on the play.

Acton had another big inning in the sixth when Lindsay's hit over second started the rally. Masales placed another to second base but Lindsay went out on the play. Masales stole second and Jack Kenney drew a walk with two down. Scott's clean hit over second scored Masales and landed Kenney at third. Jordan came through with a hit to second that brought in both Scott and Kenney. Leader drove a nice one over second for two bases and advanced Jordan to third.
