Resignation Night Held by Acton Council Monday

Board would be present at a hearing on October 11th in connection with the election of Acton into the status of a town. A letter from the Ontario Provincial Police notified Council that no grant could be paid until an approved pension plan was established and the forms sent in were returned. The Clerk was instructed to secure the proper forms to establish this pension fund so that Acton could qualify for the grant. The Clerk was instructed to secure two tons of salt for the roads.

In view of the large increase in assessment under the new system the Clerk was instructed to prepare a new Band Grant by-law changing the amount from a half mill on the assessment to a half mill grant of \$500. This will have to be voted on at the general elections. The present band grant is about \$500 while under the new assessment this would be about \$1200.

Constable Grant Allan presented his resignation to Council to take effect October 6th. He thanked Council and Chief Harrop for the courtesy extended during the term of office. Council accepted the resignation with regret and appreciated the service he had rendered.

The Clerk consulted with Chief Harrop on the situation before any move was made and considered his suggestions. Mr. Harrop was agreeable to any solution Council could find on the problem. In view of the circumstances which required immediate attention, Council decided by resolution to contact the Provincial Police to arrange for police duties to protect Acton after October 6th, and will consider permanent arrangements for Acton to come under provincial police jurisdiction.

Council received the resignations of the members of the Cemetery Board and the Secretary-Treasurer and this posed another problem. A report of the work of the Board was received with the resignations and a general summary of the finances. Members of the Board are Messrs. V. B. Rumley, H. R. Forre and Geo. Musella.

The following resolution was passed: That the following constitute the members of Acton Cemetery Board and the same be and they are hereby appointed as such: Thos. Nicol, Chairman of Parks, until December 31st, 1949, J. H. Creighton until December 31st, 1950; W. J. Oakes until December 31st, 1951, and that in future, the chairman of the Parks Committee automatically be a member of the Cemetery Board. Court of Revision on the 1950 assessment was arranged to be held on Monday, October 17th, at 7:30 p.m. (D.S.T.). It was decided to continue the collection of garbage as at present and not separate the collection of ashes and garbage as last winter. Council agreed to allow use of the curling rink for a horse shoe pitching club provided cost of the lights was assumed by the club.
