By just such factics some very good prople, with the very best intentions are helping our own private devils to get in some very eflective licks We have heard them larguing, for instance, that there are many admirable things about the communistic theories -- that they jibe completely with the teaching of the Man of Galilee That is as perfectly time as it is a perfect devil's argument. It permits in some strange way the direction threat of communism. It keeps them and others from recognizing that they are arguing an absraction; for the communist theories that they use as a base of argument have no shadow of existence in the political thinking of to-day. Or they argue that socialism is

the basic Christian doctrine. That is true, with qualifications. With the "good to all" men, there is also the demand for the unalterable integrity of the individual-his right and his obligation to use his own gifts and make his own choices, to improve and enlarge his talents, not hide them in a napkin until someone is ready to take charge of them for him. The final devil's argument is that politically socialism is a dead duck. What folly, when better than one out of every eight -in a set-back election-still voted for it. They should remember that a party that took almost as great a heating has governed the destinies of this country during half the years since confederation and will again.
