Maclaren Quebec power company has notified us that storage run-off conditions are such that they will be obliged to reduce delivery of power by 3,385,000 kilowatt hours per week commencing October twenty-fourth STOP This represents a reduction of 550,000 kilowatt hours per day, Monday to Friday inclusive, with the balance absorbed over the week-end. Reduction will be offset in part by arrangements which it has been possible to make through the cooperation of Gaineau Power Company and Canadian Niagara Power Company STOP Additional voluntary conservation and strict compliance with the regulations is required to offset the balance of this reduction in resources STOP Your cooperation urgently requested
