GVP ANTIFREEZE RUINS MANY CARS

Antifreeze can be a cheap blessing or an expensive curse, warns Laird S. Goldborough in a Reader's Digest Consumer Report, in the November issue. Many motorists, ignorant of the properties of antifreeze fluids, will be victimized this winter by gyps who make and sell corrosive, salt-based antifreeze solutions.

These crooks, Goldborough states, annually peddle a million gallons of antifreeze that is rancid to cars. Made with a few cents' worth of ordinary salt, mixed with water, a gallon of the gyp solution may be priced at \$1 to \$3.50, comparable to the price of good antifreeze. But every gyp gallon costs some motorist ten to hundreds of dollars for repairs. In a lawsuit now pending the plaintiffs charge that a single salt-base brand has caused \$10 million damage to cars.

The worst types of the gyp product, termed "ferociously corrosive" by the author, are regularly sold with claims that they "will not attack, corrode, rust, clog or harm any kind of metal, rubber or paint surface." But tests have shown that the salt-base solutions cause serious corrosion of the cylinder block, water pump, radiator, and especially of any aluminum parts, such as cylinder heads. Resulting corrosion products cause partial or complete stoppage of water passages, with consequent overheating and boiling.

Good antifreeze is compounded of one or more of the alcohols. The Reader's Digest article points out. Wood alcohol and grain alcohol account for 75 per cent of all good antifreeze sold. The so-called nonvolatile glycol antifreezes make up the rest.

(The average car in good condition loses one to two quarts of coolant every 1,000 miles, Goldborough says. Nearly all of this loss is down the overflow tube, very little by evaporation. To prevent loss, do not overfill your radiator. When you see the liquid, don't put in any more. Keep the solution on hand and replace losses with the solution, not with straight antifreeze from a can. Under no circumstances should any antifreeze be left in the cooling system during the summer.)

Munitions, strict military discipline, and civilian controls are necessary evils of war; they are not the means of peace. There must be a cease fire on both the fighting and economic fronts before peace and its blessings can be enjoyed. Danger of war compels the free nations to co-operate in maintaining sufficient munitions to discourage attack but it does not necessitate the civilian controls with which economic war is being waged among the democracies. Of all controls, price control is the worst threat to economic peace. "Fair" political prices can be attempted only by totalitarian governments whose economic systems they ultimately destroy. The restoration and preservation of free markets for goods, services, and money must be achieved or the controls with which the economic war between the sterling and dollar areas is being waged will prevent peace and encourage totalitarianism to risk a shooting war.



Paints that change colour with rise and fall of temperature are being marketed by a Montreal company, says the Financial Post. Specially designed for use in a wide variety of industrial applications "Tp" or Temperature Indicator paints, are suggested for use on hot water tanks, heated vats, boilers, motors, shafts, storage tanks, oil baths, wire coatings, etc. Change from one distant shade to another at a particular critical temperature, e. g. yellow changes to pink at 125 deg. white to buff at 190 deg. manufacturer states. Resumes natural color when temperature drops. Said to adhere to all types of metal, wood, concrete and stone.

SEAWEED FOOD VALUE

Seaweed is being used more and more as both a food, and for animal fodder. Its value to mankind was stressed recently by a leading United Kingdom botanic expert, Professor Newton, speaking to an audience of scientists at the British Association conference. The direction which future work and research in developing this rich natural source of vitamins should take, was discussed. Professor Newton said that recent experiments have shown the common brown seaweeds to be particularly rich in vitamins. A large field of work awaited biochemists in extracting these, and presenting them in palatable, easily digested form, for human consumption.
