

**Little DeVries Awarded Soil Building Championship**

Early last spring the officers of the Halton Crop Improvement Association announced their intention of sponsoring a Soil Building Competition. With the co-operation of the Agricultural Societies of Acton, Georgetown and Milton, three such competitions were undertaken, and between thirty and forty entries were received. It will be readily realized that little or no appreciable improvement can be made in one season. Consequently the awards were based on the farm operator's present program from a soil building standpoint. Needless to add, it took into consideration the entire farm program, keeping in mind such factors as (1) numbers of livestock in relation to farm acreage, (2) acreage in cultivated crops vs acreage in hay and pasture, (3) crop rotation of rotations, (4) seed mixtures and rate of seeding, (5) manorial and fertilizer treatments, (6) liming, (7) tillage practices, (8) wood lot management, (9) diversion ditches, etc. In short, a rather comprehensive survey was made of each farm business.

N. J. Thomas, of the Soils Dept. at the Ontario Agricultural College was the official judge. While Mr. Thomas has not as yet submitted his complete report, some of his comments will be of interest:

"All can be considered good farmers but not perfect. Some fell down on seed mixtures others on rotations, others on cropping balance, others on fertilizer practice (rate and mixtures), and others appear to be overstocked hence the shortages and still others are understocked, hence abundant."

In a year such as 1949 crop yields had to be pretty well ignored, but as we intimated previously, a more detailed and complete report will be available later, so in the mean time here are the awards:

The high score for the three groups was awarded to the Soil Building program being carried on by Little DeVries, of Georgetown, RR No. 5.
