ONE-SIDED ARGUMENT

Labor has always demanded that increased values due to worker's effort should be shared with the worker as wages—his part of the profits of production. It is a hard argument to deny. It has logic in it and business sense and humanity. Recently, however, Sam Eason Canadian director of the textile union, unwittingly disclosed an essential weakness. He was telling the Canadian Congress of Labour that the devalued pound was permitting British cotton and woolen goods to underbid the Canadian product and that textile companies were suggesting wage cuts to enable the competition to be met. Mr. Eason nailed his colors to the mast. "Under no circumstances," he said, "will we agree to any wage cuts even if it means a general strike." One cannot help wondering whether an argument that is championed when it works for us and rejected when it works against us can be called honest.

In addition, the coaxial cable gives high quality reproduction of speech. The coaxial cable will be used as a link between London and Birmingham in the provision of the British Broadcasting Corporation's Midland Television Service.
