Halton Deanery Anglican Young People's Rally

The theme of the rally was "Let Your Light Shine". The proceedings got under way at 3:00 o'clock with an opening devotional period taken by Grace Church A.Y.P.A. Milton. The theme was introduced by Rev. Albert Ongley, Youth Chaplain of the Diocese of Niagara.

Four enrichment groups were conducted as follows: The Dominion Conference of the A.Y.P.A., conducted by Mr. Harold Baron, Past President of the Dominion Council A.Y.P.A. of Hamilton; "How to get the Light", conducted by the Rev. Albert Ongley; "How to get the Light shining", conducted by the Rev. J. Homer Ferris, Chaplain of the Diocesan Council, A.Y.P.A., of Milton and Program Building conducted by Jack Patterson, President of the Diocesan Council A.Y.P.A., of St. Catharines.

Supper was served by the ladies of St. Paul's Norway, after which Evening Prayer was held in the Church. Mr. Harold Baron was the Preacher and took as his theme, the theme of the rally. After the Service a Fire-Side hour was held in the Parish Hall. A feature of this was the presentation of "People versus Youth", a panel discussion which revealed much about the history and accomplishments of the A.Y.P.A. since its foundation in 1902. Refreshments were served bringing the day to a very pleasant close.

Farm Forums of Halton County Are Summarized

Forums that sent in reports to the county press correspondent this past week were: town line, Dunagh, Kelso, Boyne, Zimmerman, Mt. Nemo, Kilbride, S.S. 4 Equestrian, and S.S. No. 1 Nassagaweya. The topic for discussion for the evening was, "Should there be Federal aid for Education," a subject which all forums realized is of first-hand importance to themselves and the future generation.

As to what Government should do concerning the Canadian Teachers' Federation's appeal to Ottawa for financial aid to the provinces for elementary and secondary education, the opinion was unanimous that the Dominion Government should give financial aid where it is needed and establish minimum standards in all provinces. Five of the forums added that at the same time the provinces should be left in control of education as at present.

This was because, as Town Line pointed out, "if the province of municipality has no voice in the control of education it will lose interest." S.S. No. 4 Equestrian says, "Teachers could teach in all provinces and students could move from one province to another without hindering their progress." Boyne thought if the poorer provinces minimum standards were established it would give every Canadian child equal opportunity. Also, it would make for better Canadian unity if we had a Canadian school system.

When it comes to the question, "What do you consider the most serious educational problem in your community?" Mt. Nemo observes, "There is only one thing touching and that is Russia and the atomic bomb." Five forums replied that injurious taxes were their problem. Some said they were paying taxes for schools they would never receive any benefits from. Zimmerman thought, "Taxes should not all be borne by the land-owner, but tenants should be taxed as well. Indirect taxation was favoured rather than land tax." Other problems mentioned were poor teachers daylight saving time, and unsatisfactory courses for rural pupils.

Juryman Jailed For Failure to Appear for Duty

For his failure to observe a summons to act as a jurymen, George E. Syer, Burlington was sentenced to serve two days in the County Jail by Mr. Justice G. A. Gale, at the sittings of the Supreme Court here yesterday.

When Mr. Syer failed to answer to his name when the jury panel was called at the opening of the Fall Sessions, His Lordship instructed a constable to locate the man and bring him to court. He appeared yesterday morning.

When asked to explain to the Court his reason for not attending, witness stated he had made a delivery of produce to New York and was delayed by illness. He admitted receiving the summons to serve as a jurymen two weeks ago. When confronted with a certificate signed by Dr. C. E. Rodkin of Burlington, November 11th, stating he was under medical care and would be unable to serve as a juror, he said he suffered asthma.

The Court declared it could not accept the man's explanations adding, "The citizens must realize their duties as a primary service in the administration of Justice in Ontario. You serve in a doctor's certificate and drove all the way to New York. If you are able to drive a truck all that distance you are certainly able to sit in this court as a juror. You will serve two days in the jail for contempt of Court."
