Annually with amazing persistence the chronic complaint that Acton is not having an Intermediate hockey team this year crops up. The reason of the rumor, and it is a rumor, would be difficult to find for just about everyone accepts it as gospel. As a rule the average fan can rattle off a dozen different reasons why this deplorable condition exists.

This year was no exception. Up until last Sunday there was no indication of an attempt to form an Intermediate club here in the cradle of Halton champions. Then some of the boys who'd rather play hockey than eat couldn't stand the tension any longer. Apparently they were beginning to believe the phony official ice story then they realized the truth it was contagious because this scab was beginning to subsist to that theory also.

However, in a sudden flurry of organization these chaps who personally play the game and know what it's all about held a pow wow in the town hall. To the delight of everyone present they found there was nothing preventing the formation of an Intermediate club except maybe an incredible amount of idle gossip which said they couldn't cope with teams trained on artificial ice.

Shades of the past! I'll wager identical words to these were uttered in the dim and distant past when Acton didn't have an enclosed arena. Fellows like Neil Gibbons, Joe Kentner, Gordon Beardmore, Nelson Gardner and more of their ilk probably subjected to the same brand of discouraging remarks. They were told they couldn't hope to compete with neighbouring clubs who enjoyed the benefits of an enclosed arena. Acton had only an outdoor rink then situated at the foot of John Street adjacent to the Crescent Bridge. But it's history now that the Acton club without an enclosed arena were superior to any opposition encountered in this vicinity and that includes Milton and Georgetown who had a roof over their heads respectively. Heads Eventually the tough constructed an indoor auditorium. From the 1 to 4 years they were in the O.H.A. the Tanners dominated the hockey scene in the parts.

According to the same old original decision the incoming Stars, in spite of all obstacles, formed an Intermediate team. With out imports it was estimated 22 players were eligible and willing to play. A committee was named to approach Council on the split of arena profits. Monday night Council agreed to terms. Consequently it looks like an Intermediate club will represent Acton in the O.H.A. Best of all it will be composed entirely of home brews.

It's unlikely Acton will be grouped with Georgetown, Milton, Oakville, Weston, Brampton and Dixie. These clubs, an Int. A group are slated to commence their schedule next week leaving Acton out. However, a projected Int. B group is on draft north of here which could include Acton, Bridgeport and Fergus, are entering clubs in Int. B ranks, and that might be some clue to a grouping.

The star defenseman of last season's semi-finalists is playing Junior B with Guelph Billmores this term. Jack Kentner Jr. and Leno Marz, played with Georgetown in the annual Sheeny Test series which came to an abrupt halt last week in preparation for O.H.A. wars. Milton and Georgetown have their full quota of imports this year to carry the Int. mail. So have Oakville.
