new pump had a gasoline auxiliary in case of a serious power interruption. The new pump will give 180 gallons per minute and the old one the same. Cost had been \$3500. Mr. Hansen pointed out the need for a greater supply of water in the near future. Acton was running close to the safety margin in supply and demand. He stated 20 per cent of the water pumped was lost some place in the system. He also gave statistics on new services, extensions, etc.

Touching on the Hydro Department Mr. Hansen told of the new construction work jointly with the Bell Telephone Co. A new sub-station would be erected in 1950 near the CNR property. He told of revenue and finances and said the department was not short of funds in spite of the fact that no increases had been made to the consumers. He pointed out the need for replacement of the present warehouse with a more permanent structure and some of the funds would have to be allocated to this work.

Mr. Thom Jones of the Public School Board told of conditions at the Public School where the 380 children were crowding the building at present. The next few years will see greater increases in school population according to census returns and start on a new school will be necessary. He told of the finances of the school and the improvement made. A new boiler would be required before the next heating season.

G. A. Dilla reported on the North Halton High School Board. The Acton representatives realized the need for additional rooms at the Public School. The effort thus far to have a central school had been unsuccessful and the Acton officials had secured information on the cost of sending pupils out of the district. He said the whole educational program was very much in a fog and the plans of Hon. Dana Porter and the lack of the Commission report left the issue very much beclouded.
