TOURIST PURCHASE

Purchases by Canadian tourists in the United States during August hit an all-time monthly peak. Financial Post is informed. Using their \$100 exemption, returning Canadians declared purchases to a value of \$4,175,000 in that month.

Almost \$2 million of this was spent on clothing. There were also close to 10,000 radio sets brought into Canada in that month, half a million dollars worth of household furniture, \$347,000 of boots and shoes and \$1 million in miscellaneous items.

For the first eight months of 1949, the dollar total of declared Canadian tourist purchases is about \$16.4 million, more than was brought in the entire calendar year, 1947.

BURLINGTON

Harry Saunders, chairman of the Burlington-Nelson High School Board informed the Gazette this morning that the architects are advertising for tenders for building the addition to the high school. This will be welcome news to citizens generally. The tenders close early in January.

A very tight vote was cast in the municipal election on Monday, when Geo. Howell, Mel Howden, Harry Cassidy, Mel Hatram, Sam Ferguson and John Stott were elected to the council for 1950. The by-law to levy one-half mill annually to provide funds for the Boys' and Girls' Junior Band was carried by 507 votes for and 287 votes against the by-law.

An occasion of interest locally was celebrated on Friday night, December 2nd, when the Niagara Brand Spray Company Limited, Canadian associate of the Niagara Chemical Division, Food Machinery and Chemical Corporation celebrated its 40th Anniversary as a local industry, by being hosts to all employees at a dinner in the Tower Room at the Grand Inn. OAKVILLE

Substantial majorities in polling subdivisions 1, 2 and 3 gave Deputy Mayor Howard Latchfield a lead with victory over Reeve Phil Chambers in Monday's town elections. The present Reeve jumped to the fore in polls 4 and 5 but his margin in these subdivisions was not sufficient to overcome Mr. Latchfield's commanding lead. The voters 819-1 gave him a majority of 50 over Mr. Chambers, who was supported by 729 electors.

Rejected only in polling subdivision 4 and there by a meagre majority of 12 ballots, the \$100,000 arena debenture bylaw was approved by 511 town ratepayers Monday. With an even 400 property owners opposing the proposal, the resulting 141 majority set in motion the long awaited public subscription campaign designed to raise the remainder of the amount required to build Oakville's new community centre in Trafalgar park.

5. Avoid crowds as far as possible.
