THE MIXING BOWL

Best Christmas wishes to everyone! May your house be bright and gay and people in it be cheerful and content with their lot.

It is easy to make a unique festive setting in your home these days with such variety of choice in wreaths, flowers, balls, bells, Santa Clauses, reindeer, sleighs, Christmas trees, church and snow scenes. It is wise to select one theme and one centre of attraction for a special decoration. It may be that your buffet is the centre. If so, the outline of a landscape may be sketched on the mirror with soft soap, then on the counter place a model of a church, or a skating scene may be designed, using your table mirror, cotton batten, imitation snow and driftwood branches further decorated with miniature gadgets.

For a children's Christmas party setting, use a Santa Claus paper tablecloth and over it place a clear plastic cover. In the centre, mold together a big Santa Claus head using buttons for eyes, nose and mouth and don't forget to rough his cheeks. Of course, you will need a piece of cone-shaped cellophane for his tunic. To distribute the candies evenly at the table, we suggest Dixie cups with a tiny Santa Claus standing over each and you can ration out 3 or 4 small candies per Dixie cup.

For the coffee served at midnight the scene takes on a Christmas air with a glowing Christmas candle on the tray or one large candle placed in an ash tray, surrounded with bits of cones tipped with color in the centre of your serving tray.

There was a time when we used our best tablecloth for family gatherings but today we seem to use such things as pale blue foil, fastened together with Scotch tape to make a tablecloth, or red cellophane, sealed with silver tape, or any of the patterned tablecloths that come in extra large sizes. Paper serviettes also are attractive and can be made personal by the addition of each name in red crayon or gold pencil.

Sprigs of holly added to the servings of plum pudding may not be edible but are an added touch to your festive table.

RECIPES

GRAPE JUICE COCKTAIL
3 cups grape juice
3 cups ginger ale
Chill ingredients thoroughly, mix and serve. Add half a green maraschino cherry to each glass. This makes six servings.

GIBLET GRAVY
Gizzard, heart and neck of fowl
1 tsp. salt
4 tbsps. fat left in roasting pan
4 cups cold water
4 Bay leaf
5 tbsps. flour
Cover the gizzard, heart and neck with cold water. Add salt, Bay leaf and pepper. Bring to a boil then simmer, picking out any pieces of meat and bones. Blend in flour and cook until brown. Chop the giblet and pieces of meat fine, add to the thickened juice, keep it hot until serving, but do not boil.

DRESSING FOR A LARGE TURKEY
12 cups of soft bread crumbs
1 1/2 tps. pepper
1/4 cup melted fat
2 eggs, slightly beaten
1/2 cup salt
4 tbsps. minced fried onions
2 tbsps. sage
1 cup chopped apple
1 cup chopped celery
Prepare bread crumbs, measure into a bowl. Add the above ingredients, toss lightly together and stuff fowl.

ROASTING TIMES FOR POULTRY

Chicken
6 lbs. (undrawn weight) - 2 1/2 hrs.
Goose
8 lbs. (undrawn weight) - 2 1/2 hrs.
12 lbs. (undrawn weight) - 3 1/2 hrs.
Turkey
10 lbs. (undrawn weight) - 2 1/2 hrs.
14 lbs. (undrawn weight) - 3 1/2 hrs.
18 lbs. (undrawn weight) - 4 hrs.
Preheat oven to 325 degs. F and place the bird, breast side down for first hour of roasting. Remove from the oven for basting to prevent loss of oven temperature. When the bird is turned over, place strips of bacon or a thick paste of flour and dripping over the breast to keep the meat moist. (Be sure to salt well.)

The Sentinel Is Relieved

They are tearing down the Collegiate Reformed Church at 5th Avenue and 48th Street, New York to make way for a 21-story office building. The lovely Gothic tower, which has been a landmark as much to tens of thousands of occasional visitors as to New Yorkers, is giving place to the practical. It is almost as if they were tearing down old Trinity, the grey symbol of God among the towering financial monuments of Wall Street, or "the little church around the Corner" with its suggestion of peace and "otherworldiness" within a short stone's throw of probably the greatest commercial thoroughfare of the world; or as if they were tearing down any one of a hundred other familiar Houses of God on the crowded streets of a hundred of our own cities.

No one can argue with the practical aspects of the case. No one could be foolish enough to aver that St. Nicholas's, the Collegiate Church of 5th Avenue, could compare in financial returns with the same space occupied by a 21-story office building. All the careful economic arguments support the claim that a church is as well off and as useful in less costly neighborhoods. That is the trouble with economic arguments, they touch only the surface of things -- the benefits that can be tabulated, the nicely balanced profit and loss account. But not all benefits can be measured in dollars. There are some that must be assessed in the peace and serenity of human hearts.

When the darkest days of war were upon us church doors stood open and men and women were not ashamed to seek there the assurance and hope and compassion they could find nowhere else. But today, a man would be almost afraid to enter. He would be hearing in his mind the half-jocular, half-complaining comments of his friends "Poor old Bill he must be in quite a jam. I saw him going into St. George's today. Wonder if he's sicker than we think?" Yes, poor old Bill may be sick, sick with his own bewildering problems, as poor old Bill's world is sick. Both are weary with trying to solve the unsolvable by the only measures they know--gold and political pressure and power politics.

The downtown church is passing, falling back before our economic arguments--its falling attendance, its lessening revenue. But who can measure the cost to us and to our world? We have lost a sentinel over our lives, the symbol of a reassuring certainty. That was the certainty that supported General Gordon in his last solitary vigil at Khartoum when deserted by all, he looked out beyond the encircling foes for the relieving column that he knew would come, too late to say with a tranquil and confident heart "The hosts are with me!"

OAKVILLE

C. R. Crawford, principal of Central public school, for the past 14 years, has resigned his position. The resignation of George Bonney as recreational Director of the Oakville Recreation Commission has been accepted by the commission. Fred Turner announced this week.

EGGS MOVE FROM EAST

During the fall the egg market took a somewhat unusual turn. For the first time in nearly forty years, there was a large movement of eggs from eastern to western Canada. During September-October no less than 48 cars of 20,876 cases moved from the east to the Prairie Provinces and Northwestern Ontario.

The unusual demand posed something of a conundrum, because baby chick sales in western provinces last spring increased by 8.5 per cent over the previous year. The movement seems to have arose from unprecedented demand and a scarcity of eggs in British Columbia, the normal source of supply for additional requirements for the Prairies.

Poultry officials in Ottawa think the likelihood of this east-to-west demand continuing in future years is somewhat remote. They point out that storing helps to meet local requirements, and it will probably be a larger factor next year.

WHEAT RESEARCH

A wheat research institute is to be established at Wagga Agricultural College, New South Wales, Australia. The institute will undertake research in all phases of wheat growing and will also examine the baking qualities of wheat produced in Australia.

The Burlington Yacht Club held its fifth annual dinner on Friday last at the Estiminet. The affair, well attended, brought to a close activities of the club to a close. Several out-of-town yachtsmen were present.

Capacity crowds filled the new St. John's United Church auditorium last Wednesday and Thursday nights, for the presentation of the Public School Christmas concert. A franchise has been granted to Art Scott for operation of a new bus route from Inglewood to Milton, Herald.
