

The majority of council favoured payment of architect's fees following a lengthy discussion in which members of Esquesing council voic-

ed strong opposition. K. Y. Dick, reeve of Milton, and chairman of the special building committee for the Home, gave a lengthy report on the progress since council voted in favour of the erection of such a home last July.

He told new members who were not familiar with what had transpired that council decided on the matter after it had learned it was estimated \$103,000 would have to be spent on improving the existing jointly owned buildings at Brampton. He said these plans were not approved by the Department of Welfare and were scrapped. After a second set of plans had been drawn it was found that \$168,000 would have to be spent to take care of those already living at the Brampton Home Then if expansion was considered a new wing would be constructed at a cost of \$65,000 to accommodate another twentyeight persons. Furthermore, it was estimated an additional amount of \$30 000 would be required to Instal a new boiler and heating system, and a further amount of \$25,000 to take care of sewerage.

Mr Dick pointed out the commission would be faced with a \$289,000 expenditure to remodel the old building Halton representatives refused to assent to this expenditure before bringing it before Halton council. It was then decided if a major amount were to be spent by this council, it should be

on a new Home of our own, he said. The special committee explored the possibility of Halton and Peel building the new home jointly but officials of the Department of Welfare advised against it.

Stating there were 56 Halton persons at the Brampton Home, Mr. Dick added a survey had been made by municipal clerks as to who may desire admittance to the new home and it was found that the crection of a building to accommodate 100 persons would be most logical and would economically serve the municipality for another five to eight years. However, the committee felt, he said, indications were that additional room would be needed in the near future, and the architects drew a master plan of a building that would accommodate
