Taxi and Pool Room By-Laws Are Discussed

The Canadian Underwriters Association asked that the matter of surplus parking at the reservoir be left until their inspector could make a report.

A letter from J. McMullen asked why snow was not removed from in front of his premises as in other places on Mill St.

A letter from the Dept. of Highways approved a grant on last year's road expenditure amounting to \$3300.

Superintendent Harrop gave a report on the snow removal from private properties and the Clerk was instructed to send accounts for these amounts at the cost to the town of \$7.50 per hour.

It was decided to discontinue the practice of renting snow fence in the summer as damage was more than the revenue derived.

Residents of Zone One objected to the erection of a dairy building on the Highway in the Leishman survey. Since no application or plan had been received, no action was taken.

Messrs. W. Linham, C. B. Swainhamer, R. R. Parker and C. McKeown, on behalf of Acton Fair Board, conferred with Council on the location of the swimming pool in the park. If the location designated was used, there would be no place for the cattle tie area. The Fair Board has visited the park and it was felt the best location for the cattle tie area was in the west end of the park inside the track where the horses were presently exhibited.

The posts to be erected would not interfere with any future development and moving the cattle show to this end of the park would relieve the congestion at the Park entrance. The Board made this suggestion for Council's consideration.

The Parks Committee and Fair Committee were to arrange to visit the Park and survey the property so that the best possible mutual arrangements could be made. The meeting in the park was arranged for Saturday afternoon at two o'clock. Council was thanked for their consideration.

Council passed a resolution discontinuing post sanitarium care to cases which were not considered in need.

The Clerk made a report on the payment of business taxes and licenses when notices were sent out and that nearly all the amounts were now paid.

The Cemetery Board asked permission to use the town lawn mower on the plot at the front of the Cemetery rather than purchase a new machine. The matter was left for the Parks Committee to investigate.

It was decided to charge \$1 a month for collection of garbage from a trailer on Queen St. Accounts were approved for payment as follows:

The surveying account of E. P. Bowman in connection with the sewers of \$389 was passed but other sewer accounts were held until the meeting of the sewer committee arranged for the following Monday.

Council approved of purchasing tax fluorescent fixtures for the Council Chamber from the Public Utilities Commission at an installed cost of \$45.

The taxi by-law was read and amendments considered and the following resolution was passed: "That this Council recommend that By-law No. 808 and 822 be amended to charge \$7 fee for cab drivers and must be 21 years of age and that each driver be issued with a numbered badge; also by-law to read \$15 for first cab \$10 for second cab and \$5 for each additional cab; also that lost or defaced badges must be replaced for a cost of 25c."

Another resolution amending the by-law altering the age for persons in pool rooms from 18 to 16 years of age was lost on vote of Council. The present by-law remains in force and no one under the age of 18 is permitted in a pool room.

Council discussed the snow shovelling by-law and notice altering the by-law was to be published and if the law is not observed prosecutions are to be instituted.

After discussion on the garbage collection, the solution was left for recommendations from the Garbage Committee.

A letter was received from the solicitor regarding the purchase of property from Mr. Dyck.
