

A REMARKABLE EXAMPLE of the goldsmith's art is this handsome. desk set presented to Donald Gordon, chairman and president of the Canadian National Railways. Inside the lid of the gold box the engraving reads: "To D. G. from his associates in the Bank of Canada, Poreign Exchange Control Board, Industrial Development Bank," There is a leather-bound book, inscribed "A memento of our pleasant associations and an expression of our good wishes", and filled with signatures. A map of Canada is engraved on the lid of the box, with Canadian National lines shown in red, and an outline of the facade of the Bank of Canada appears at the Ottawa location.

Affixed to the onyx base are the arms of the ten provinces.
