Fourteen Forums Report Increased Interest in Topics
Fourteen Forums in Halton County report a good attendance and increased interest in Forum topic for Monday, March 20, namely "Organization in a Community". Judging by the number of Community organizations listed it is quite evident that the day is long when a farmer's activities end with harvesting his crops in the fall, and he and his family settle down for a quiet winter of rest and peace. The country community of today offers many and varied activities of interest both for young and old alike.
The first question, "Do any of these organizations overlap in their activities?" It was interesting to note that in certain localities they claimed there wasn't any overlapping in aims or activities, while others felt that probably hockey on Monday night did interfere with Farm Forum to a certain extent.

Maritime Marshes To Be Reclaimed
The Dominion Government has recently completed an agreement with each of the provinces of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick for the reclamation of the marshlands which have "gone out to sea", or are in danger of it because of the weakening of the dykes and other protective works. The Legislatures in both provinces have recently passed legislation empowering their governments to enter into such agreements and to encourage the marsh owners to assist in the reclamation works and develop a sound marsh development program.

During the last few years the Dominion contributed one-third of the cost of repairs to the dykes and other works, but under the new arrangement the Dominion will assume the entire cost of construction of the main protective works. These works consist of dykes, abutments and breakwaters. The provinces and the marsh owners will assume responsibility for the canals and ditches behind the main works, and proper organization of the marsh bodies.

The marshlands of the Maritime are some of the most fertile agricultural lands in Canada and are an important factor in the agricultural economy of the province. It is estimated that about 100,000 acres of excellent farm land will be reclaimed in time.
