FRANCES BINNIE
Earl Grey, Sask.
Francis Binnie passed away at his home at Earl Grey, Saskatchewan on Thursday, March 30, 1950. Born in Quebec City on May 18th, 1857, the eldest son of Peter Binnie, Preb. Scot., and Sarah Knowles, County of Cork, Ireland, he moved at an early age to Erin, Ontario, where he lived until 1882, coming to Regina in November of that year.

Predeceased by his wife in 1930, Mr. Binnie is survived by six sons, James A., Frank and John D., of Earl Grey, Archie of Crahan and Charles and Peter of Acton, Ontario. Five daughters, Sarah K., Margaret and Janet at home, Mrs. J. A. Macdonald of Earl Grey, and Mrs. W. H. Johnston of Southey. Also eleven grandchildren and nine great grandchildren. Only 4 of 9 Municipalities Have Assessment Ready

by-law to set up a County Court of Revision until September when there seemed to be a difference of opinion among some members as to names already submitted. Most members agreed there be no need to hasten the appointments as most municipalities had already held their own Courts of Revision this year.

Reeve Litchfield, Oakville, said he thought Oakville and Trafalgar should have representation on the new board as they were the largest municipalities in the county. Names mentioned as probable appointments to the new Board included: John Blair, Burlington; Col. G. O. Brown, Georgetown; J. Rhyh, Milton; Alex. Near, Nazagaways and S. McKenzie, Georgetown.

Members rejected a request by the Grand Jury to have a toilet and wash basin installed in the jury room. Councillors felt the cost was too great at the present time when notified the installation cost would be in excess of \$250. They agreed with Mr. Litchfield's suggestion to purchase a new washing machine for the jail at a cost not to exceed \$100. He told council he would be able to purchase a good machine at cost price for the county.

Frank Cowan of the Crown Insurance Agency was present to have the County's liability insurance renewed. He informed members the premium was up a little over last year, but that accounted for a general increase over the province. He further stated that Halton had an excellent rate in respect to the loss ratios over a period of years. The new premium as renewed was \$575 as against \$488 last year which includes coverage of the Lowville Park.

Col. John Barber, C. O. Lorne Scots Regiment, was present and spoke to council with respect to the council's yearly grant to the regiment. He expressed thanks for all the county has done in the past. Members approved of the usual grants of \$500 to the Lorne Scots Regiment and \$500 to the Regimental Band.

Final arrangements were made by members to invite the school children to the Annual County Council School Children's Day set for May 9th. Prizes ranging from \$10 to one dollar are provided to the children submitting the best essay on their visit to Council.

Nothing was done in connection with a short discussion regarding margarine when Reeve Geo. Currie sought to have council petition the federal government to restrict the importation of oils for this purpose. He said it was unfair to agriculture as this new commodity was substituting the products of the farms.

Reeve W. H. Bigger agreed with Mr. Currie's remarks while Warden VanSickle felt that some of this could be blamed on the feed problem today. He pointed out the prices of feed were too high, much of it included distribution costs.

Mr. Bigger, in his report on the O.A.E.A. said it was one of the poorest conventions he had ever attended. Deputy Reeve Lauder informed council he would have a more detailed report ready for the next meeting in respect to County Fire Protection. He said in his interview with the Fire Marshall the Marshall was impressed with Halton being the first county seeking information of the County Fire Protection scheme.

Long associated with municipal affairs in Peel County James J. Jamieson resigned from the office of secretary treasurer of the Halton Peel Home for the Aged. A former Warden, Mr. J. Hooper was appointed to succeed Mr. Jamieson, Warden VanSickle told Council.

Accounts approved and ordered to be paid were: Education, \$28.80; County Buildings, \$208.85; Hospitalization, \$1,628.90; County Roads, \$7,631.94; Assessment, \$17,880; County Home, \$58.74; Finance, \$2,599.27; Agriculture and Reformation \$1,580 and Printing, \$85.54.

Council adjourned to meet again on May 9th.
