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Inspector Appointed For Installation Of Sewers

By the rules. The by-law stipulating these regulations was read and passed.

A resolution was passed that all arrears of taxes be published in the auditor's report for 1949.

The engineer had prepared a draft of the duties required of the inspector of sewers. A copy of these duties was to be given to the inspector.

The Clerk was to arrange for the surveyors to survey a roadway to the disposal plant.

A resolution was passed engaging the services of A. E. Cripps as inspector of sewer installations at a salary of \$45 plus car allowance of \$15 per week. The contract was to cover the duties as outlined in the engineer's recommendations and also as covered in A. Vines contract.

Council recessed for fifteen minutes for lunch at 1:30 p.m.

Council considered changing of the by-law regulating the running of dogs at large but this was left until another meeting.

Sewer accounts were withheld until the engineer and inspector could be contacted on the special night set aside for sewer matters only. It was decided that at these special sewer meetings, no delegations would be heard or regular Council business receive attention.

The Clerk was instructed to send accounts to four men who were engaged in business and collect business tax from them.

A letter from the Women's Institute asked that Council consider the need for supplying public toilets in Acton and suggested that the Town Hall be used for this service. Investigation was to be made on the suggestions offered.

A letter from Mrs. M. Williams asked if Council would pay half the cost of material for a fence between her property and the park. Mrs. Williams was desirous of erecting the fence. The Council was agreed to this arrangement of paying the material cost share.

Information was received on a rescuator for the town use. Nothing was provided for in the estimates for this item but it was felt that perhaps service organizations would be interested in supplying this item. Cost was between \$200 and \$300.

The Clerk reported that Constable Wood had left the force and Constable C. Trenner was now in charge of the Acton detachment. A report was given to Council on the visit with Inspector Knight following the complaint sent by Council. Notice was also received from Provincial Police headquarters that a change had been made and when a constable was on leave only two men would be on duty here. Each man would have a leave of three weeks in the year. If Council did not approve of this arrangement the contract for Provincial Police could be terminated.

The Clerk gave comparative figures on the cost of hauling gravel by town truck and by private contractor.

It was decided to carry a bond on the assessor and assistant clerk for \$5000 the same amount as the assessor. A resolution was passed as required appointing Frank Crump as assessor.

Instructions were given regarding the collection of dog tax and poll tax.

Council decided no responsibility would be accepted on an indigent now in Erin Township.

The Y's Men's Club offered to pay \$100 toward the cost of painting the halls toilets and lunch room at the arena. Estimated cost of the work was \$300.

Council favored that the arena be painted and the toilets cleaned, and appreciated the offer.

Councillor Thompson brought forth the need for a grandstand and dressing rooms which could possibly be worked in connection with the swimming pool. Broken limbs on trees needed cutting and broken bottles in the park should be cleaned up.

The condition of the cemetery was discussed by Council and it was felt the required help should be hired immediately to put the cemetery in condition. Councillors McLeod and Thompson were empowered to secure the required help and have the work done immediately at both cemetery and park.

Council adjourned at 2:15 a.m.
