Erin Council Meet Petition Shelves \$500 Conferred

Five hundred dollars was granted to the Erin Agricultural Society for capital expenditure, by the Erin Township Council at its meeting on May 1st.

The treasurer was instructed to collect \$75 from each of the two School Areas for the cost of auditing the school accounts for the past year.

A resolution regarding daylight saving time was omitted from the April report but it is to go into effect on May 1st to co-incide with neighbouring municipalities.

Reeve Hurt was appointed as the representative of the council to the Memorial Committee of the Erin Agricultural Society.

A petition regarding certain portions of the township roads was placed on file until an inspection is made by the Road Committee.

General accounts amounting to \$220.08, Relief \$270.23, and Roads \$3463.28 were passed.

Reeve Hurt presided at the meeting and all councillors were present.

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
