Says the Creemore Star: Few issues of this paper appear in which there are no public sales advertised and articles listed reflect our present mode of living and working These changing times are aptly reflected in a comparison of the present day sale offering and what was offered 100 years ago. We reproduce a sale bill published in Cynthia (Kansas) Log Cabin of Feb 1. 1848 which was furnished us through the courtesy of Mr. C. Glenning of Detroit, a former resident of Avening who is a regular reader of the Creemore Star. Note the auction sale included six negro
