Acton Day June 25th

A week from Sunday, June 25th, Acton will mark with a fitting service the elevation of this community to the status of a town Actually Acton has been officially a town since the first of the year. It is fitting that a suitable event in which all citizens and friends of the past and residents of the district could participate has been provided.

Acton has had the required population for becoming a town for the past ten years and is now nearer the 3,000 mark than the required 2,000 population. For seventy-seven years Actors was an incorporated village. It took sixty-seven years to gain the second thousand population and the last ten years sees almost the third thousand increase.

Sunday, June 25th will be a momentous occasion. For many of us the village was a friendly place in the days when we knew who resided in every home, could call every one by name as we met them on the street and most of the population were employed in either the tannery or the glove shop. There are many happy memories of the Village which has been replaced by the Town.

fact that growth is shown, that identification of residence is helped by numbered houses and places of business; that even if we can't name all we meet they are still friendly, and they may be employed in any of the eighteen industries which now ship products to world markets from Acton. Sunday, June 25th is a great day for Acton and for all of us to take part.

It is a matter of deep regret that Rev. A. C. Stewart, who had planned to speak to Actonians on that day was so suddenly called to the higher community. The spirit and life he gave in service to Acton and district for nine years will always be cherished in the hearts of those who remain and will be present in Acton Park on June 25th and in the years that follow.

Delay and Dissatisfaction

The new county assessment that was inaugu rated in Halton to improve and equalize the County rate is not proving very satisfactory and it appears will even be more costly than the old + plan of holding a County Court of Equalization. It is twenty-eight years since the assessment of Halton has been equalized and it is obvious that the figures now being used are unfair to many municipalities and very favorable to those places which have had greater growth and expansion municipalities who are carrying more than their share of the County levy.

We believe it is now about five years since Halton started the new county assessment and yet we find that only three of the municipalities have completed their assessment while six are still unfinished and stalling the inauguration of the system. The municipalities which have finished the work may well ask why? If the assessment can be done in three it can be done in the other six. Completion would settle a lot of present dissatisfaction. Evidence of this dissatisfac-. tion may be seen in the attempt of the North Halton High School Board to secure a more equitable basis for sharing of school costs.

If the assessment is going to be delayed further it might be well if County Court of Equalization were demanded of County Council. Twentyeight years has seen too many changes and five years is certainly long enough to inaugurate the new assessment plan.

'Failing a Court of Equalization a fine of a minimum of \$1000 a month might be an incentive for the delaying municipaities to bestir themselves. But, of course, such a stipulation might be difficult to find favor when the majority would be subject to fine. Democracy has its limitations, too.
