Car Rolls Over Lands on Wheels Goes on to Guelph

Stripped patch of loose gravel on highway No. 25, three miles north of Milton, two motorists of Guelph district narrowly escaped serious injury when their auto skidded and rolled completely over on the road. The accident occurred at about 1:30 a.m. Sunday.

The car was driven by Robert Bishop, 23 and owned by John C. Laking of R. R. 3, Guelph, a passenger.

The car rolled over, landed on its wheels and was able to continue on to Guelph. The roof, fenders and doors were badly crushed but no serious damage resulted to vital mechanisms. Total damage was estimated at \$500.

Upon arrival in Guelph the occupants of the car reported the accident to Milton police, and Bishop complaining of a severe headache, was taken to Guelph Hospital where it is believed he may be suffering from concussion, no other injuries resulted.

Coroner's Jury Suggest Eliminate Highway S Curve

Coroner's Jury Partially Blames Curve in Fatality Involving Rockwood Man and Two Milton Girls

A coroner's jury last Friday recommended to Halton County Council the S curve on the second line south of Palermo be eliminated. The inquest presided over by Dr. Russell T. Dingle was called to inquire into the death of Reginald Butler, Rockwood, who was fatally injured in a motor truck and car collision on May 18. The jury believed the S curve was partially responsible for the motorist's death. The verdict said Butler died from injuries received in an accident between a car and a tractor trailer at approximately 4:30 in the afternoon. They believed the driver of the transport, John A. Ouderkirk, Toronto, did everything he could to avoid the accident. According to the evidence, the jury believed the condition of the highway, the position of Butler's car just prior to the accident and the narrow condition of the S curve, was partially responsible for the accident.

Two young Milton ladies riding with Butler received serious injuries. They were Misses Aurora Marcas and Tina Tonelli. Both had been removed to the Oakville Memorial Hospital for treatment. Lloyd Dingle, Crown Attorney, conducted the examination of witnesses.
