**\$3,200 Additions For Mill Street Waterworks Main**  
Arrangements Made with Esquimaux Co. for Water Service and Changes in Various Connections

Mr. R. R. Parker of Esquimaux Co. was present at the regular meeting of Acton Public Utilities Commission on Tuesday evening to discuss with the Commission the installation of a 2 inch water on the water service for summer water at the laundry. It was decided that the regular one inch line should be discontinued and that a permanent installation made for the 2 inch line instead of the temporary summer line. A number of other connections between the town's lines and the laundry services were also discussed and a satisfactory agreement reached.  
Superintendent Wilson reported that a terminal pole had been placed at the new sub-station where the power will come out to the town's transmission lines.  
The Council had requested that the Commission install a water main on Mill Street east from Wellington Street to Acton Boulevard. A price of \$6 per foot had been obtained from Esquimaux Construction Co. for digging, laying and back-filling the line. The Commission to supply all materials. The length of the main will be approximately 1050 feet to loop over to Arthur Street as an alternative to dead ends on the water lines. The total estimated cost of this installation, along with a fire hydrant will be approximately \$3,200.00.  
A check is being made in a number of factories about town to get the voltage at the end of the distribution lines. The service department of the H.E.P.C. is trying to improve voltage to the consumers and hopes that when the new sub-station comes into operation the voltage will be considerably improved. A letter is to be sent to Chairman Saunders expressing the Acton Commission's disappointment in not having the station in operation when originally planned and asking that matters be hurried along as the present station is badly overloaded.  
A letter had been sent to the Conservation Division of the H.E.P.C. of Ontario, asking particulars of changing over a factory and using converters. No answer had been received but one is expected shortly.  
Arrangements were to be made for the erection of a power service to the sewage disposal plant by way of the Third line.  
A notice from the Consolidated Pump Co. stated that the motor for the pump at the spring would be shipped immediately.  
Instructions were issued for the purchase of 1000 ft. of 6 inch water main, 2 feet 3 valves and 1 hydrant, also the necessary amount of lead and washers for the installation of the extension to the water mains.  
Instructions were issued for the placing in the hands of the Bailiff, an unpaid account.
