

**Dan Holmes Wins Junior Farmers' Championship Trip**

Seventy-two Halton Junior Farmers competed for the Championship Trip to the OH Club Congress at Chicago. The award is based on the high aggregate score for the two judging competitions held in March and June, and in addition the winner must have coached a team of junior fairs over a definite number of livestock classes. The March competition was held in conjunction with the County's Seed Fair and Bacon Show, while the second competition classes of gourds, small seed potatoes, hog carcasses and meat, root vegetables, seeds and forage plants. As announced in last week's issue on Saturday, June 3rd, the 2 young men judged a total of ten classes in all, two each of the cattle, sheep, hog, horses, hens, turkeys and pheasants. When everything was taken into consideration, Dan Holmes of Trafalgar Township was the top competitor and was voted with the rest of the members of all parts of the contest when they met in Chicago at the time of the International Livestock Show.

The runner-up was Jack Marchant also of Trafalgar Township who thereby won the Kingsway Special of a short course at the O.A.C. next winter. That competitor was also awarded the Duncan Campbell Trophy emblematic of the beef cattle championship.

Dick Haines was also the winner of the Provincial Junior Farmers' Trophy as coach of the winning team composed of John W. Pickett, Jim Williams and Grant Stark. The second prize team was coached by Geo. Princeton, third place team by Jack MacIntosh and fourth by Mac Sutcliffe.

Frank McNabb of Esquerring Township was the champion judge of the two competitions and there by won the Naval Junior Farmers' Challenge Trophy. The same competitor won the Donald Robertson Trophy emblematic of the high competitor in heavy horses. Ward Brownridge of Esquerring demonstrated that he is still the champion livestock judge, having the high score in livestock and topping no less than three of the five sections. He was awarded the Bartronon Trophy emblematic of the championship in Dairy Cattle. Herb Wilson of Naval Juniors was awarded the Mason Knitting Co. Trophy for sheep judging while Wm. Brain of Milton Juniors won the Thor Bikkelsk Trophy for Swine judging.

Naval Juniors demonstrated that when it came to judging they still have the Club to beat winning the Bank of Nova Scotia Trophy for Esquerring Township with their livestock team of Ward Brownridge, Fraser McNabb and Stuart Alexander. Trophy for the Club with the six high competitors on the aggregate score of the two competitions. Their representatives were Fraser, McNabb, Geo. Wilson, John Currie, Howson, Ruddell, Floyd, Bridgen and Gordon Bird.

The High Novice of the day was Geo. Rogister of the Palermo Club, who thereby wins the C.N.E. Shield.


