all members around this table and I sincerely hope this will continue."

Reeve William Marshall, Georgetown. "These figures seem to be very fair. However, I think Georgetown is a little high but we won't argue about that. I believe our assessment will be about this figure when we are finished."

Reeve Ted Tyler, Acton. "I have received instructions from my council to endorse this recommendation of the committee. I must compliment them for the very fine job they have done."

Reeve George Currie, Esqueping. "I am well pleased with this meeting tonight. I have seen a lot of bitter scraps between the north and the south in this very room but I am glad that feeling has disappeared. I too, am prepared to support the motion."

Warden William Vansickle. "As representative of Nassagaweya, I am very appreciative of what you men have done. I think the scale as set down in the recommendation is very fair."

The Warden reminded members the last revision was in 1928, which cost the county an enormous amount of money. "Just because there was strife between the north and the south. I am glad to see this has been agreed upon amicably while we sit around this table. I thank you one and all for receiving the report of this committee."

Approval of the new figures ended a threatened appeal of the assessment by both Nassagaweya and Esqueping Township. They argued at a previous meeting the equalized assessment figures were not in accord with other municipalities.

Ford Rogers, county assessor, explained to council different features of the new assessment scheme.

Warden Vansickle spoke very warmly of John McIven, reeve of Nelson, who died after a brief illness. "John McIven is an old stalwart of this council and he has done a good job. I would appreciate it if every member of this council could attend the funeral on Monday," Warden Vansickle concluded.

Arrangements are being made, it was decided to hold the county picnic on July 8 at the Lowville Park. Counsellors Ken Holdsworth, Ted Tyler, K. Y. Dick, H. Littlefield, J. E. Whitelock, W. J. Robertson and R. S. Heatherington were named as a committee to head the event.
