Halton Families Enjoy 6th Picnic Halton Federation

Over 500 Attend Annual Picnic in Halton County Park at Lowville last Friday

The picnic of the year was staged at Lowville Park last Friday when over 500 attended the sixth annual picnic of the Halton Federation of Agriculture. Families came from all over the county to participate in what has proven over the years to be an important event in the program of the Federation.

Shortly after nine o'clock the children from the 27 schools, their teachers and parents, began to arrive. The five diamond managers and the ten umpires were also on the job and at 10:15 a.m. the twenty two teams rolled out on the five diamonds to battle out the winners for the first round. Trafalgar No. 1 and 6 came through with the highest score and the runners up were: Nass. 1 and 3, Nass. 4 and 5, Nelson 12 and 13, Nelson 9 and 11, Esqueping 14, Trafalgar 13, Trafalgar 22, Nelson 8 and Nass. 7.

The second round resulted in the Nassagaweya 4 and 5 at the top with Nass. 1 and 3 a close second. Bronte ousted Trafalgar 13 by a score of 5 to 4 and Nelson 12 and 13 downed Nelson No. 8, while Nelson No. 9 and 11 eased out Nass. No. 7.

In the third round, Nelson 12 and 13 went into battle with Nass. 1 and 3 and what a battle it was. In the last inning the Nass team gained the winning run. No. 4 and 5 Nass took Trafalgar No. 13 on a score of 11 to 8 and Nelson 9 and 11 won over No. 5 and 6.

In the fifth round, Nelson 9 and 11 came up against Nass. 1 and 3. It was only a slight error on the part of the Nelson team which cost them the game and therefore shut them out of the finals, the score 10 to 9.

The fifth and final round brought the two top teams of the day together, Nass. 1 and 3 versus Nass. No. 4 and 5. This was not only a game between the boys and girls of these schools, but their teachers were right in there boosting. A full seven innings were necessary to prove a winner. Nass. 4 and 5 finally came through with a successful play which gave them two runs over No. 1 and 3. Nass. 4 and 5 was therefore declared the Champion team for the day and were presented with the Milton Milling Co. Trophy. This makes it the third time in six years that No. 4 and 5 Nass. have won this trophy.

Those who have followed the Rural School Children's Softball Tournament for the past six years were loud in their praise for the manner in which the boys and girls played the game and noted the advance in the development of good sportsmanship. No umpire got away with any guesses, these children know the game and are right in there checking the umpires if they think the play is in doubt. One of the umpires was heard to remark that it was easier to umpire for the Senior ball team as these lads do not let you away with anything.

Some three hundred children lined up for the schedule of races, owing to the large entries some classes had to be run off in sections, and the three winners in each class were girls under 5—Kay Babberstock, Helen Sampshaw, Jeanette Murray, boys under five years, Reg Senata, Wayne Ackland, Johnnie Martin, girls under 7, Rose Anderson, Aileen Powell, Paul Coulson, boys under 7, Barry McKeown, Bryan Howden, Ronald Durver, girls under 9, Helen Bridgman, Beth Campbell, Marion Bigger, boys 9 and under, Glen Broughton, Wayne Easterbrook, Dennis Bowan; girls 11 years and under—Marilyn Eves, Jeanette Syloy, Doreen Van Sickle, boys 11 years and under, Phillip Peor, Robert McMullen, Carl Reed, girls 13 years and under, June Campbell, Janice Baker, Ruth Brazier, boys 13 years and under, Bill Sauve, Bill Thompson, Geo. Gibson and Ronald Tasker (tie); girls 13 years and over, Joan Bowman, Donna Marshall, Janice Baker; boys 13 years and over, Bill Shields, Wayne White, Bill Watkins.

The Rural School Teachers of the North took the teachers of the south for a ride in the teacher's ball game. However, the margin was very narrow.

The horseshoe pitching contest drew considerable interest when some of the older fans stepped into the game giving the younger lads some keen competition. Merv Stude and Bob McEnery however, proved their ability to ring the pegs and won the honors.

The prizes for the oldest persons on the grounds went to Mr. Geo. A. Bell who was 90 years old on June 8th and the youngest went to Bryan Walker, Acton, 9 months. The prize for the largest family in attendance went to George and Mrs. Coulson.

In 1948 the Federation purchased the 35 acres from William Featherstone and since then \$12,000 worth of labour and supplies have been donated to improve the site of the park. The natural amphitheatre provides a splendid ball diamond and program centre with people seated on the surrounding hill. 12-mile Creek adds to the natural beauty and suitability of the site. Wading for the little children and shallow swimming is possible with complete safety. The park is so popular that dates are booked ahead and an early enquiry seems to be the only way to secure the park for a day.

The deed for the Halton County Park located at Lowville is vested with the County of Halton and controlled by a Board of Managers. Five of these men are appointed by the Federation of Agriculture and two by the County Council.

Water Drilling Started Tuesday Commission Report

The Commission will give this matter consideration.

Mr. J. Gordon applied for water service to a house he is building on Peel St. The laying of a main on this street was left over until the next meeting.

Superintendent Wilson was instructed to purchase 800 feet of aerial cable. This material will be used to install a line from Church St. along Frederick St. to the Wool Combing plant. It is necessary so that a number of large trees will not have to have most of the large branches cut out. This new cable weighs approximately two and a third lbs per foot and costs \$1.62 per foot. The total cost of this cable is \$1,296.

Superintendent Wilson reported that 14 lights had been broken at the park after the garden party last week. The names of the culprits were obtained and the amount was being collected by the police from them.

Superintendent Lambert reported that the motor for the spring pump was now ready and was to be picked up shortly.

A complete report on the condition of the water tank is being awaited from the town engineer, so no action will be taken until this report is received.

The well drillers, J. R. Sproul and Son started Tuesday drilling test holes for a further supply of water under the instruction of Council. The Commission and those members of Council present adjourned to view this operation at Wartime Housing.
