CANADIANS SHOULD AVOID PANIC BUYING SAYS POST

Little if any panic buying has occurred in Canada as the result of the Korean crisis, Canadians should keep it that way, says the Financial Post.

A rush to buy now would only result in making scarce goods scarcer and prices, already high, still higher.

Moreover, any extra civilian buying superimposed on heavy defense purchases that are almost certain to come could have most serious and speedy repercussions. Selfishness and shortsightedness at this time would be sure to lead another dangerous spiral of inflation.

Cleaver Resents Little Bureaucrats

"I'm not going to be pushed around by the little bureaucrats we have in this county," Hughes Cleaver told Trafalgar Township Council Tuesday afternoon. His remark was made to council during a discussion of the sewage situation at the Kent Gardens housing survey north of Oakville, a project of Trafalgar Construction Co. of which Mr. Cleaver is a partner. There were several stormy passages between Mr. Cleaver and Councillor Cumberland, Deputy Reeve Joseph Wickson, and Dr. J. M. Mather, director of Halton County Health Unit.

E. M. Dunham, assessor for the Township of Trafalgar, stated that the assessment rolls being prepared at present for 1951 taxation in the township would not be finalized until September.

The youngsters of Oakville's west side—between four and five hundred of them—had one of the times of their young lives on Saturday. The occasion was the sixth annual picnic of the Westside Community Club known to everyone as "Ollie Burk's picnic."

\$2000 Smoke Loss At Scott Motors

The ringing of the fire siren at one o'clock last Friday morning brought the fire brigade to Arthur Scott Motors, Ltd., where fire caused by an overheated fluorescent fixture threatened the building.

Georgetown Public School board is planning some improvements at the school to provide better fire protection for the second floor of the building. Since an extra classroom was added last year by converting the former assembly room into two classrooms there has been an additional fire hazard. Two hundred and forty pupils are now accommodated in six upstairs classrooms and two of these have no secondary exits.

Enrolment at the Stay-at-Home Camp on Monday totalled 324. The unprecedented number of children who are taking advantage of the camp facilities this year sent recreational director J. L. Self and his staff the search for additional help.

A change of managers at the Roy's Theatre will take place this week. Art Burckman who has managed the theatre since Ernie Crawford was transferred to Kingston earlier this year has received a promotion to head office in Toronto and will be leaving the end of the week. Herald

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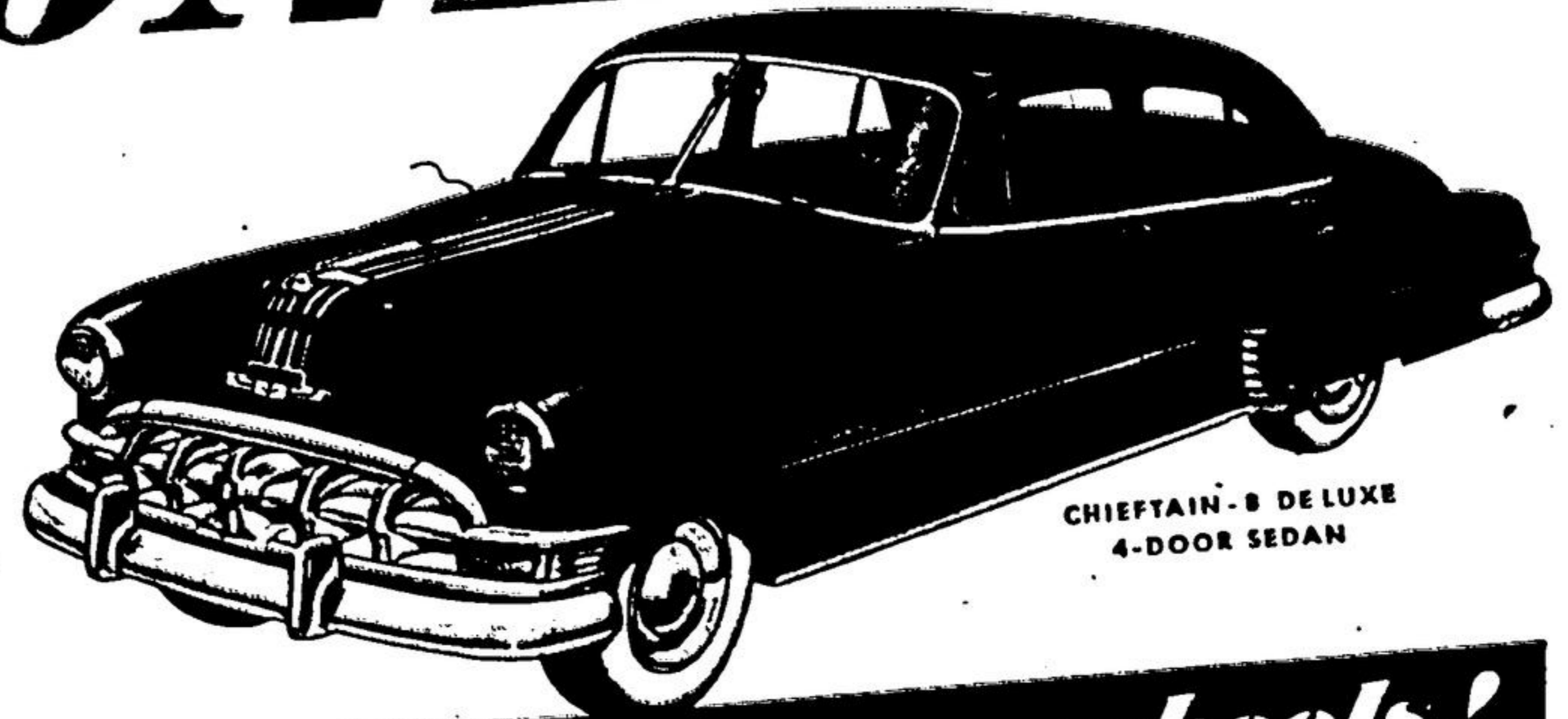


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
