Exciting Saturday Session As Ints. Take Waterdown

Pushing over four runs in the bottom half of the ninth, Acton Intermediates overcame a three run deficit and posted an 11-10 victory over Waterdown Merchants last Saturday afternoon, here, in an exciting finish as you'd care to witness. Heroes for the locals were "Dude" Lindsay and "Mac" McDonald, who came through with a couple of timely hits in the ninth to boost their runs-batted-in averages by two and salvage what looked to be an untimely loss.

The old "Dude" why, by the way, was hitting not a humble .750 but a lofty .800 on the day, smashed a rousing triple into deep" left field with two on board to spark the four run rally. Jack Hough was issued a free pass and McDonald proved excellent on the occasion with two out by polling a wrong field single into right that sent both runners home, clinching a win.

The teams went into the ninth tied at 7-7. Waterdown plated 3 runs in the top half by nicking 4 hits off southpaw Don Ryder, who had replaced Sam Snyder on the mound in the sixth.

Lefty Favoret went the distance for the Merchants. He allowed 11 hits, one of them a three run homer to Jack Hough of the locals in the first inning and included triples by Lindsay and Runstadler and two doubles from the bats of Masales and Scott.

The Merchants, aided by Russ Bruah's sage advice on how to hit Sam Snyder, touched Sam hard in the first six frames but Don Ryder's injection in the sixth left them scoreless until the ninth.

To the mill in the top of the fifth, Matt Tyler sent his latest acquisition, Tommy McKenna, on whom the Actons are depending in part to be a pay-off man in the approaching Int. The big gun for Acton was Don McDonald, the speed boy from Guelph, who made life miserable for Spence by hitting safely three times in four trips, one a three bagger to deep center, in addition to playing a sparkling left field Lorne Masters and Sam Snyder hit two for three.
