the digester and disposal plant. Instructions were issued to the property committee to investigate the hiring of an architect to arrange additional accommodation for municipal purposes.

Council confirmed the authority of the Fire Chief in investigating and taking action in a building on Mill Street where a fire menace is definitely present.

Clerk McGeechie reported that with a few alterations, one of the pumps now owned by the town could be utilized on a well.

A motion to place supplemental wind insurance on the arena, grandstand and band stand was placed to the extent of \$40,000.

The property committee was to investigate the condition of the grandstand and see if it could be cleaned up.

Mr. Ed Jennings was present to discuss the purchase of the property owned by the town on Mill St. W. and purchased by them as a possible location for a sewerage disposal plant.

Mr. Jennings wanted to purchase the property and the town drew up the costs involved in the original purchase. The actual acreage was doubtful and until this was cleared up Mr. Jennings felt he could not consider it.

Council was asked to meet with Mr. Graham of Guelph regarding the increasing of the size of the present test holes so that a correct test could be made and to discuss the possibility of drilling a third in a new location.

G. A. Dills and Reeve Tyler reported on their interview with the representatives of a manufacturing concern regarding the possibility of a new industry locating in Acton.

Councillors Greer, Hargrave, Thompson, Roszell, Deputy-Reeve McLeod and Reeve Tyler were present at this special session with Mayor Mason presiding.
