

SEWER LATERALS Several instances have occurred where sewer laterals have NOT been put in at the proper grade or depth due to inaccurate informat-

Section (f) of Clause II of Bylaw No 910 of the Corporation of the Town of Acton reads: No person, association, body or Corporation shall construct or install on any private property a sewer drain connecting with a sewer of the Corporation until: 1. Such party has applied to the

Corporation of the Town of Acton for a permit allowing the construction and installation of said house sewer or sewer lateral and paying such required fee for such permit as may from time to time he fixed by the Corporation of the Town of Acton; and

2 Given twenty-four hours' notice that a house sewer or sewer lateral is ready for inspection and under no condition must they be covered up before being inspected 3 Every person shall be required after a house sewer is installed or altered and before the plumbing fixtures connected therewith are used, to have same inspected by a competent Sanitary Inspector or such other person, as may be designated from time to time by the Corporation of the Town of Acton before they are covered up, enclosed or hidden from view.

Copies of this By-law may be obsoined on request at the Municipals Offices and should be consulted before any work is started in connection with laterals or house

Accurate sinformation as, to grades and depth of laterals can be obtained by consulting the sanitary icenector int the Municipal Offices when making application for constructing laterals or house sewers.

A NEW LOOK in sleeping car styles is being introduced by the Canadian National Railways. This is the modern duplex roomette car, and it sets a new low cost for room accommodation aboard trains. There are 34 roomettes in each car, twelve at floor level and twelve raised two steps higher giving the car an unusual exterior appearance. The culaway section above shows the interior of the rooms prepared for daytime and night travel, and at left is a close up view. The interior fittings, furnishings and color schemes are of the latest designs developed by railroads on this continent. Each room is completely private, equipped with water cooler, toilet facilities, wide mirrors, medicine cabinet, outlet for electric razor, and individual controls for lighting and air conditioning.
