



Check Germination of Seed Wheat

Last week we reported wheat badly sprouted. We note the same condition is reported in most Western and Central Ontario Counties. We are glad to be able to report that this condition is not quite as general over Halton as we anticipated a week ago. Nevertheless, it is sufficiently general to necessitate a close check on the germination of the seed to be planted this fall. Certainly those buying fresh seed should only purchase seed backed by a grade which includes a germination test. Those wishing to use their own seed would be well advised to immediately forward a one pound sample of their wheat to the Plant Products Division, 36 Colborne St., Toronto. The cost of securing the grade and germination test is only 75c per sample and certainly in a year such as this it would be cheap insurance.

Suggested Prices for Seed Wheat

The Seed Marketing Committee of the Ontario Crop Improvement Association recently met and reviewed the wheat situation including suggested prices for seed wheat. It is the feeling of the Committee that when a grower goes to the trouble of cleaning up his wheat for seed and the securing of a government grade, that such wheat should be worth at least fifty cents over milling price. It is also the general opinion of this committee that when the wheat market gets straightened away that milling prices will be around \$1.75 per bush. This means \$2.25 per bush for Commercial No. 1 seed wheat. Registered Dawson Golden Chaff will likely be available at \$2.75 per bush. As Council No. 15 is concerned very little registered seed will be available this fall and that which is available will sell at a premium over the \$2.75. However, irrespective of price it will be poor economy to take a chance on seed of poor germination. In many cases the extra \$1.00 invested per acre for good seed will be a cheap investment. We would again urge our readers to treat their grain for smut and furthermore wheat in one crop which some times out of ten will give returns for the extra investment in commercial fertilizer. By the way, if you haven't a fertilizer drill it will pay to rent one. A lime and fertilizer spreader is a good piece of equipment when it comes to applying fertilizer on a pasture or distributing lime but when it comes to applying commercial fertilizer on grain experimental work both in Canada and the United States reveals that it takes at least twice the amount to get the same results when it is broadcast as when it is drilled in.

New Seed Treater for Stewarttown Plant

It has just been brought to our attention that the Seed Cleaning plant owned and operated by Walter Lawson, Stewarttown, is to be equipped with a new Swedish machine which automatically treats the grain against smut at the same time as the grain is being cleaned. Mr. Lawson is to be congratulated on this progressive step which will fill a long-felt want in Halton County. The power cleaning plant, properly equipped and operated, has many advantages over the old fanning mill with poorly equipped screens. It is to be hoped that in the near future another central cleaning plant will be installed at some suitable point in the southern half of the County.

Beware of New Grain

The small carry-over of grain from last year means that a lot of new grain is likely to be fed to poultry before it is safe for use. Digestive troubles caused by new grain poisoning are quite serious. The feeding of new wheat has possibly been the most dangerous but now oats and barley have also been known to cause trouble. To be on the safe side it is recommended that new grain should not be fed until at least two months after harvesting.

Some of the symptoms of grain poisoning are lethargy, dark blue comb and wattles, and diarrhea. The treatment for toxic grain poisoning is a flush with a laxative immediately. This condition is suspected. The most effective treatment is the feeding of a milk flush for two days with nothing else to eat but plenty of water to drink. As a substitute treatment use Epsom salts at the rate of 1 pound to 5 gals. of water for one day only. Another new treatment highly recommended is to incorporate 1 1/2 percent murate of potash (ordinary fertilizer grades) into the dry mash or it can be administered through the drinking water using one tablespoon per gallon. This should be given for five or six days followed by a flush.

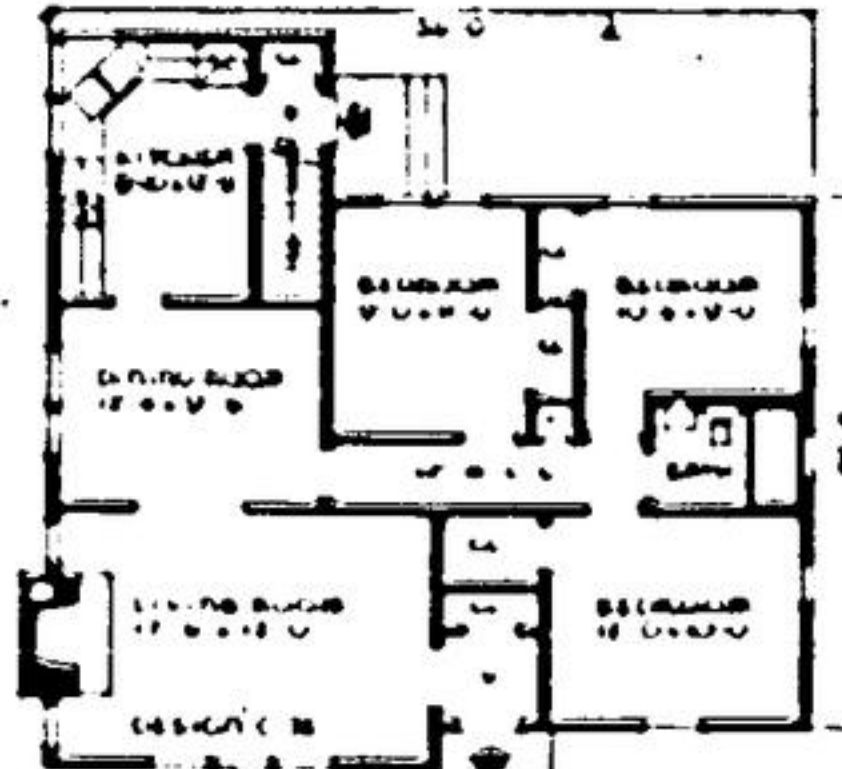
