Haltom Crop Improvement Sponsors Fifty Bushel Winter Wheat Competition

Fifty bushel winter wheat competitions are again being sponsored by the Ontario Crop Improvement Association in the Counties of Brant, Durham, Elgin, Haldimand, Halton, Huron, Lambton, Lincoln, Middlesex, Ontario, Oxford, Peel, Perth, Peterborough, South Simcoe and York. The regulations call for a minimum of five acres and the competitors have their choice of the following varieties and grades—Register No. 1 Dawson's Golden Chaff or seed not more than one year removed from Reg. No. 1 Dawson's Golden Chaff or registered, certified or Commercial No. 1 Cornell 595.

Millers Report Wheat Bad with Smut

In conversation recently with a prominent miller we were informed that 80 per cent of the wheat coming in to the mills in this section of Ontario contains too much smut to be milled. We were surprised to learn that smutty wheat is as serious a problem as sprouted wheat. Only a day or two ago we learned of one local farmer who had to sell his wheat for feed at \$1.45. Twenty-five cents a bushel

is too much money to lose when this fungus disease can be very easily controlled by treating the seed with one of the ethyl mercuric dusts, such as Ceresan or Ceresan M. In short, whether or not your wheat was free from smut this year, be sure and treat your seed this fall.

Swine Meeting Largely Attended

Kilmecott Farm owned by E. L. Taylor of Esqueping Twp. was the scene of a largely attended swine meeting on Thursday evening of last week. In addition to the members of the Haltom Boys' Swine Club, approximately 100 swine producers of the County took advantage of the opportunity to see this noted herd of imported Large English Whites. Visitors were present from Peel and Wellington counties. In addition to two classes for judging purposes, one of the first litter sows and the other of year old gilts the programme included a parade of various aged progeny of the older sows, some cross bred English-Canadian gilts and boars and two of their herd sires. A litter mate of the Field Marshall boar was supreme bred Champion at the 1948 Royal Show in England, while litter mates of the Ardmore Bradbury boar were purchased by the Danish government during the past year. Another highlight was the presence of John Angel, noted British breeder and exhibitor of Large English Whites who addressed the meeting briefly and acted as official judge and commentator. Others who spoke briefly were Stanley Hall, M.P.P., and Edwin Harrop.

Those in attendance were very much impressed by the scale, including the depth, bone construction, hams and udder development of the Kilmecott swine herd. Orders have already been received by Mr. Taylor from British Columbia, as well as various points in Ontario and the United States.

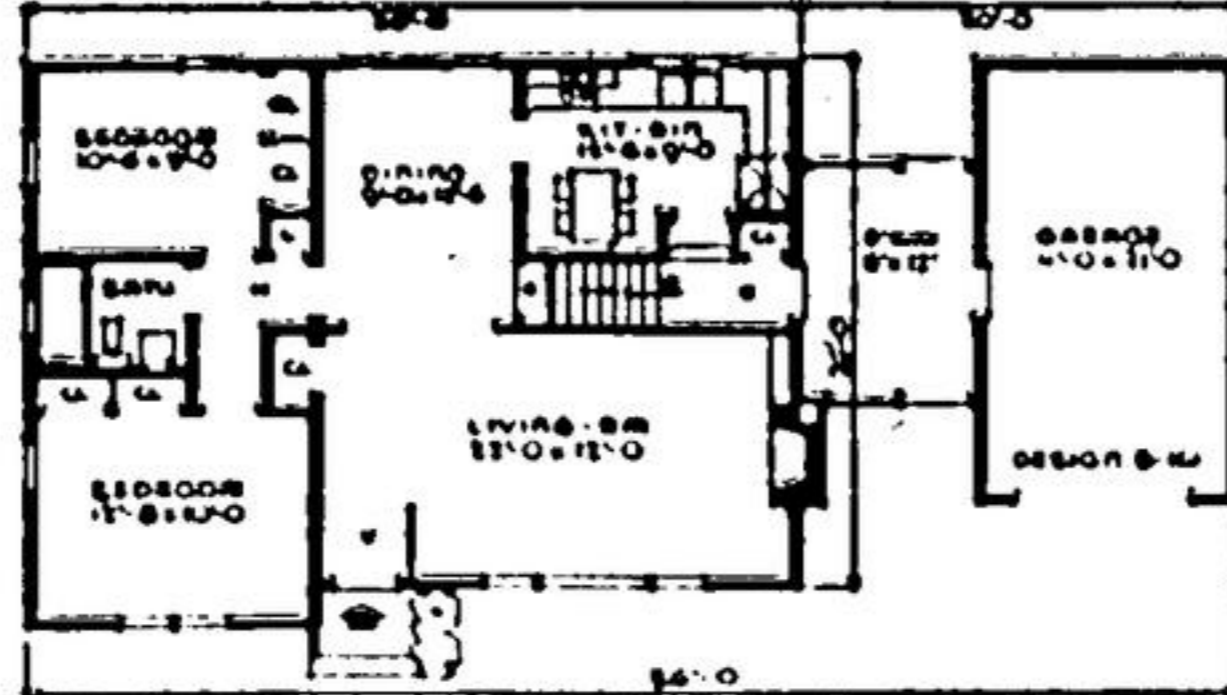

Careless Smokers Cause Most Fires

Careless smoking is America's greatest single cause of fire, states C. Lester Walker in the September Reader's Digest. In Canada last year, the careless dropping of cigarette butts led to 17,904 fires, in the United States to 155,000. Canadian smokers who disregard the danger of a live butt were responsible for more than three and a half million of fire damage in 1940.

The Digest article, condensed from Your Life, reminds its readers that the lighted end of a cigarette has a temperature ranging from 800 to 1200 degrees Fahrenheit. "Remember," the article adds, "that paper burns at 450 degrees F., wood at 475 degrees."

Everyone has heard the warning "Never smoke in bed" but apparently many do not heed it. This cozy habit has led to the cremation of 2500 Americans in recent years, many of whom burned down the building with them. Hospitals and hotels are the special victims of the in-bed smoker.

America might well emulate Europe, the author believes, in holding liable for damages any person who carelessly starts a fire. In a recent period, per-capita fire losses in various European cities ranged from six to 52 cents. During the same time, the average per-capita loss from fire in 450 American cities was \$2.22.

The article lists "a few canons of smoking behaviour": When smoking outdoors, stamp out butts. Never put a lighted cigarette anywhere except in an ash tray from which it cannot fall. Don't throw a

cigarette out of the window of an automobile. Don't smoke in closets, attics or barns—or near inflammable liquids. Never smoke in bed.

The more variation in traffic lights the more accidents, warns The Financial Post. These, it says, vary not only throughout Canada but even in metropolitan areas. Some are in the centre. Some are green and some are bluish. Some burn steadily, others flash on and off.
