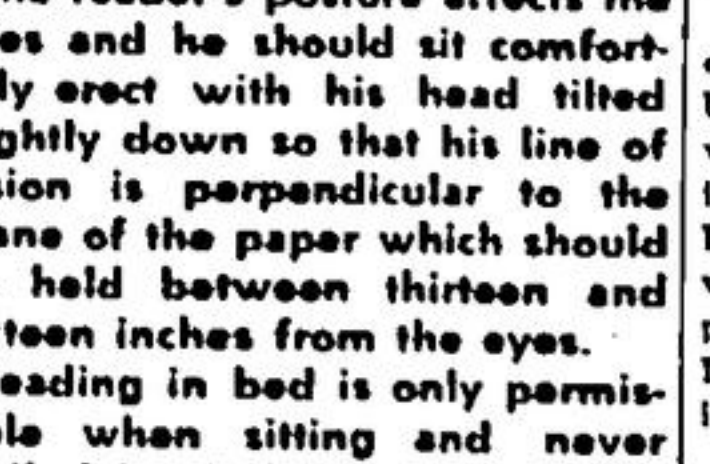

READING HABITS

Adequate illumination is very important to the reader or to anyone using his eyes for close work. A bulb, of at least 60 and preferably 80 watts, should be positioned within two or three feet of work. This light source should be shielded and placed above or to the side or rear in such a position as to avoid shadows or glare on the work. The reader should not be able to see the light source when he is reading. In addition, there should also be a source of general illumination in the room.

The reader's posture affects the eyes and he should sit comfortably erect with his head tilted slightly down so that his line of vision is perpendicular to the plane of the paper which should be held between thirteen and sixteen inches from the eyes. Reading in bed is only permissible when sitting and never while lying in bed and then only under proper lighting conditions.
