BRANTFORD SHOWS WAY IN CHILD DENTAL HEALTH
 By the introduction of fluorides to drinking water, the town of Brantford, Ontario registered a 47 percent improvement in the dental health of five year olds, and 23 percent in children of five to 16. The Brantford experiment cited by J. H. Griswold in a September Readers Digest article condensed from the American Magazine, was sponsored by the Canadian Government and has now been under way for three and a half years. Having this new way of waging war against tooth decay, Griswold says that fluorides in their natural state when added to drinking water, harden the enamel of teeth so that decay is greatly reduced. The tasteless and colorless fluorides, however, should get into the enamel while the teeth are growing. Constant use of fluorinated water by children up to 16 years "builds armor plate that causes the low decay rate to continue through life." Fluorides won't stop all tooth decay, the author says, but dentists hold that this substance will so harden teeth that if drilling must be done "it won't hurt much." An accompanying Digest article on the same subject, by J. D. Ratcliffe states that the cost of adding fluorides to municipal water supplies is negligible. A machine to care for a city of about 30,000 population costs \$250 and the cost of the fluorides averages about ten cents a year per person.

Sunday School Lesson

SUNDAY, SEPTEMBER 10th 1950
JOHN MARK, THE MAN WHO MADE GOOD
 Golden Text: "I can do all things in him who strengthens me." Phil. 4:13
 Lesson Text: Ac. 12:12-25, 13:4-15, 16:40
 Exposition: 1. Setting for John Mark 12:12-25

The company had come together to pray for Peter's deliverance. God as might be expected heard their prayer and sent the answer around to the meeting of the 45-50. But they were completely bewildered by the answer when it came. They were sure that it could not be Peter. He must be crazy. If He had not been crazy, then it must be his ghost and not Peter himself. (Ac. 12:15) Perhaps they thought he had been executed at the night. But He had had to die. He seems to have been expecting Peter. As soon as there was a tap of the door, he was on his feet and at the door listening. The moment he heard Peter's voice, he knew it was he and it was not what he expected. Even though they told her she was crazy, she stuck to it still. She was only a "maid" (R.V.) but she is the only one in the praying company whose name the Holy Spirit has thought worthy to put on record. She had faith and she alone counted. That "How" (Hebrew) had secret "leaguer" with God. Peter kept right on knocking. That is the best way to treat obstacles. Just keep hammering away. The most likely knock-out footsie when Peter's house he walked on, but how happy Rhoda must have been.

If a Missionary Party, 13:4-5. The church at Antioch had five "prophets and teachers" worthy of mention by name. This small Gentile church became a fountain of light and life to many other places. The Holy Ghost spoke to them as they ministered to the Lord and fasted. A Spirit filled mind rarely accompanies an over-filled stomach. It is not said how the Spirit spoke, whether in an audible voice or silently, in the inner recesses of the heart but He spoke in an unmistakable way. He is ready to speak to day if we will supply the proper conditions and listen. It was the Holy Spirit-work to call. It was man's work to recognize the call and set the call apart for the work. Those who ignore ordination by man are as unscriptural as those who ignore a call by God. But it was "for the work whereunto" the Spirit called that they were to be set apart. Every step in that early church was taken in prayer.

The promptness with which the church obeyed the Spirit's command is worthy of note. He had demanded the best they had for the foreign mission field and they gave them up without murmur. They would have liked to have kept Barnabas and Saul but the Spirit called them elsewhere, and "they sent them away." But, while they sent them they were really sent forth by the Holy Ghost. No directions seem to have been given as to where they were to go, so they made straight for the nearest port and thence for the old home of Barnabas (ch. 4:36). They were true to their commission, "they preached the Word of God." John Mark was the attendant of the missionaries.

III. The Separation of Paul and Barnabas 15:36-40
 While Paul was going on with his work of teaching and evangelizing in Antioch, his thoughts and heart kept going out to the converts he and Barnabas had made on their first missionary journey, and so when he could no longer contain himself he said to Barnabas one day, "Let us return now and visit the brethren in every city wherein we proclaimed the Word of the Lord, and see how they fare." The heart of Barnabas too went out towards their converts and he readily assented to Paul's suggestion. But here one of the saddest things recorded in the Acts of the Apostles occurred. Barnabas made up his mind to take Mark along. This was against Paul's best judgment. Mark had been given a fair trial on the former journey and had failed them at a critical moment. Surely, it would not do to experiment in that direction again. Missionary work is not for feeble men. But Barnabas put affection for a beloved relative (Col. 4:10) above the interest of the work and stood firmly by his ill-advised determination; just here is where many a true servant of God has made a mistake that has wrought untold mischief for the cause of Christ, putting the interests of a relative above the interests of the Kingdom of God. There was a sharp contention between these two honored servants of God and they never worked together again.
 We hear very little of Barnabas after this, but God honored Paul and his work as never before. How many a true child of God has made a mistake just where Barnabas did, and put his love for

Pedestrian Killed Struck By Truck
