(Continued From Page One) hooked to the special cooking rate power line. This lower cooking rate is only possible in commercial establishments which have a separate service to supply the current through a special meter.

The Commission agreed with the arrangements made by Superintendent Lambert in renewing the water service to Mr. VanWyck's house. The installation of sewers on Bower Avenue had uncovered the fact that the service box on the property line was considerably out of line with the place where the main was tapped. The Spar-tan Construction Co. had tangled with this pipe and had pulled the service away from the house.

A suggestion was received from the firm painting the water tank that when installing the new bottom for the tank the inside could be coated with red lead. This job could be done at this time easier than at any other time when the inside of the tank could be sand blasted. This matter will be taken up with the Horton Steel Co. when they come to install the new bottom.
