OBITUARY

Once Printer Here M. Cobban Dies

One of the very first apprentices at the Acton Free Press, Mitchell Cobban, died on September 11 at his home in Winnipeg. He was born in Acton in 1871 and spent all his boyhood here.

After learning the printing trade here, he moved to Ottawa where he was employed on the Ottawa Citizen and then, in 1910, went to Winnipeg where he lived until his death. He worked there on the Winnipeg Free Press, retiring in 1945.

Mr. Cobban was a member of the Masonic Order and belonged to Lodge 25 G. R. M., A. F. and A. M., of which he was secretary for 30 years. He was an 18th degree member of the Scottish Rite of Free Masonry, Valley of Winnipeg and a life member of Fidelity Lodge, Grand Registry of Canada, A. F. and A. M., Ottawa. He was also a member of International Typographical Union in Winnipeg.

He is survived by his widow, Estella Jane, a daughter, Mrs. Edna H. Bushby, Winnipeg; three sisters, Mrs. S. Elliott, Edmonton; Mrs. John McDermaid, Georgetown, Ont.; and Mrs. Niven M. Jackson, Calgary.
