for the year. This would be taken up at the meeting of October 18.

Correspondence was received from Central Housing and Mortgage Corporation regarding taxes on War-time Housing.

The by-law empowering Council to purchase lands from Anthony Hufnagel for the erection of a pumping station at the well on his property was given two readings and approved by Council. Purchase of the land for station and well was \$300.

Recommendations were received from the town solicitor regarding the purchase of land from Mr. Eugene Braids.

A resolution was passed making amendments to the Zoning By-law in accord with resolutions passed at a previous meeting. The resolution was passed on a recorded vote of 4 to 2.

Solicitor Leatherland gave details of establishing a Planning Board for Acton and read a draft By-law for Council's consideration. Engineer Anderson at request of Council, gave his views on a Planning Board.

The following resolution was passed: "That the following names be contacted in preparation to form a Planning Board: Theron Jones, John Creighton, C. Hansen, Frank Crump, the Presiding Mayor, Wm. Matkock and one member of Council."

The resolution dealt with the by-law: "Resolved that leave be granted to introduce a by-law to designate an area of subdivision control in which under certain circumstances, land shall not be conveyed unless it is described in accordance with and is within a registered plan of subdivisions other than Registered Plan 227 and that the said by-law be now read the first time."

Engineer Anderson reported that it was necessary to send another resident engineer and Mr. Mitchell would take Mr. Eric Hansen's place. The work was nearing completion and Mr. Mitchell would not be required to be in Acton every day.

Council discussed with Engineer Anderson the added expense involved in making three lateral connections on Frederick St. The extra expense entailed would be about \$300 and Mr. Anderson agreed to ascertain who was at fault before payment was made. Assurance was given Council that streets leading to the park would be in condition again before Fair days.

By resolution, the third line was named Churchill Road since Churchill is the oldest centre in the district and Churchill was our wartime leader.

Solicitor Leatherland read details in connection with the county equalization. The draft minute of settlement had been received from Mr. Cleaver Acton and Milton were paying more. If the settlement is accepted, Acton will pay 30 per cent more of the county taxes and several municipalities will receive reductions. However, acceptance of the proposed settlement was recommended. The solicitor urged that Acton's representatives on county council should be instructed to see that the assessment of the new assessments in Burlington and Oakville.
