Bishop Presides at Confirmation Here

The Sacrament of Confirmation was administered in St. Joseph's Church, Acton, on Monday afternoon at 3 o'clock by the Most Reverend Anthony Jordan, O.M.I., Bishop of Prince Rupert, B.C. Bishop Jordan is on a Confirmation tour of the diocese in the place of Most Reverend Joseph F. Ryan, Bishop of Hamilton, who has been ill for some time.

Rev. Father Morgan, pastor of St. Joseph's Church, Acton and Holy Cross Parish, Georgetown, received the Bishop at the Church entrance and conducted him to the altar where special prayers were offered and a cordial welcome extended to His Excellency Bishop Jordan replied, expressing his pleasure at being in Acton. He stressed the fact that Confirmation was instituted by Christ and made the candidates soldiers of Christ, stronger and more perfect Christians.

Prior to administering the Sacrament, His Lordship questioned the children on their Catechism and judging by the correct answers they did exceptionally well. Twenty children and nine adults were confirmed, the girls wearing white dresses and veils and the boys a flower in the lapel. The main altar was most beautifully decorated with red gladioli and the side altar with multi-colored gladioli. Special music was provided by the choir.

Following the Confirmation the Bishop told the congregation of the many hardships and sacrifices endured by the Catholic Indian population in B.C. and of the work of the missionaries there. Benediction brought the service to a close with the Bishop imparting the Apostolic blessing to all present.

Assisting His Lordship were Rev. C. Sullivan of Brampton, who was a classmate of the Bishop's in Edmonton; Rev. James F. Ford of Hespeler; Rev. A. Callahan of Rockwood; Rev. Francis Morgan of Kitchener, and the pastor, Rev. V. J. Morgan.
